DIRECTOR'S OFFICE

On January 20, Library Director Ramiro Salazar, Library Trustee for District 2 Gloria Malone and Assistant City Manager Gloria Hurtado met with Councilman Alan Warrick II to provide an overview of Library services in City Council District 2 as well as an update on the new District 2 Branch Library.

Library Director Ramiro Salazar, Library Board Chair Jean Brady (District 1 appointee), and Assistant City Manager Gloria Hurtado met with Councilman Roberto Trevino on January 23, 2015 to provide an overview of Library services in City Council District 1.

On January 21, Library Director Ramiro Salazar attended the San Antonio Public Library Foundation's Board Meeting and delivered an update on the Library. Digital Services Manager Ignacio Albarracin delivered a presentation regarding the digital services offered at the Library. After the meeting, Dianna Morganti, Interim Central Library Coordinator, provided a tour of Central Library for interested San Antonio Public Library Foundation Board Members.

As part of the ongoing recognition program for Library Staff, Library Director Ramiro Salazar attended a breakfast on January 22 celebrating the recipients of the 2014 Staff Recognition Award. Nominators were also invited to join in celebrating the recipients. That evening, Ramiro Salazar delivered welcoming remarks for the Library's premier Black History Month event featuring Donna Brazile at the Carver Cultural Center. The 'sold-out' free ticket event was live streamed through a partnership with NOWCastSA.

On January 25, Library Director Ramiro Salazar attended the Friends of the San Antonio Public Library Annual Board Meeting held at the Central Library and delivered a presentation.

On February 3, Library Director Ramiro Salazar and Assistant to City Council Chris Callanen met with Councilwoman Shirley Gonzales, District 5, regarding the planned improvements for the Collins Garden Branch Library.

CHILDREN'S SERVICES (SYSTEM-WIDE)

Children's Services Coordinator Viki Ash attended the American Library Association's Midwinter Meeting in Chicago from January 30 through February 2. Viki is serving as the administrative consultant for eight committees that present annual book and media awards. Included in this group of awards are the Newbery Medal, the Caldecott Medal and the Wilder Medal - all nationally recognized as children's literature's most prestigious honors. Viki was appointed to this consultancy by the current president of the Association for Library Service to Children (ALSC) based upon her many years of professional service and experience including her stint as the 2012 Newbery Medal chair.

Judging for the 2015 Young Pegasus Poetry Competition was completed on Thursday, February 12. The panel of seven judges considered over 1800 poems and finally selected 52 of them for publication. Staff is currently checking for any plagiarism issues in anticipation of sending notification letters to selected poets by the end of the month. The 2015 competition marks the 89th year of this SAPL tradition. This year's awards ceremony is slated for Sunday, May 2.

SAPL's partnership with the San Antonio Symphony continues to be positive for both organizations. To date, ten symphony musicians have presented programs at ten branches with a total attendance of 282. Funding to compensate the musicians was arranged by Jeremy Brimhall, Symphony Education Director, through the generous support of Mary Anne Crosby. These presentations continue on Saturday afternoons through May 16. A final report on this partnership, with recommendations for future collaborative projects, will be developed as the series closes out in the spring.

LITTLE READ WAGON

Every Child Ready to Read Workshops for Parents

Little Read Wagon returned to Pre-K 4SA South, West, North and East as well as the Carvajal and Knox Head Start centers to offer the next early literacy make-and-take workshop: Sounds Like Fun. Julia Lazarin revamped advertising for the workshop, emphasizing the make-and-take aspect of the workshop and promotion of a participation contest between classrooms caused attendance at these workshops to skyrocket. Parents who had not attended previously shared that they thought the workshops would be lectures and did not understand that they would be offered in Spanish as well as English. Frequently, workshops for parents are lecture-based and advertised in Spanish but presented in English, making them less enjoyable for everyone and inaccessible to Spanish-speaking participants.

Elizabeth Huber and Cresencia Huff made short presentations at several smaller Head Start centers and elementary schools, including: Hirsch, Indian Creek, Avance Early Beginnings, Hernandez Head Start, Harmony Hills, Rhapsody Head Start, Kriewald Road Elementary and Gillette Elementary. Most of these presentations were bilingual and about an hour in length.

Every Child Ready to Read Workshops for Teen Parents

Corinne Sanchez, Ronnie Webb and Xelena Gonzalez presented to at least 115 teen parents at the San Antonio Independent School District (SAISD) Teen Parent Summit on February 13. The summit was an excellent opportunity to reach teen parents at all SAISD campuses. Participants made puppets and lacing cards to use with their children. Ready Rosie subscriptions were offered to those who had not already signed up for the school readiness program. The overall success of the presentation could be judged by how quietly and intensely the teen parents worked on their puppets and lacing cards.

In addition to regular visits to area high schools, Ms. Sanchez, Ms. Gonzalez and Ms. Huber continued their work on the new project with Seton Home, a residence for teen parents. Soon they will begin delivering services and purchasing materials for the residents and staff to use with the children.

Mr. Webb visited MacArthur High School and San Antonio Can High School and Child Development Center. Mr. Webb will continue to schedule more visits to high schools that have not yet been served this school year.

Library Promotion

Ms. Huff attended the Woodlawn Neighborhood Association meeting on January 27 to promote the Play & Learn series at the Woodlawn Wi-Fi Room. Meeting attendees were very interested in helping to spread the word and joked that they also would like to having programming with play dough and art activities for adults. Viki Ash staffed an information table and distributed Every Child Ready to Read posters at the January 17 Early Childhood Resource and Training Fair.

Play & Learn

Little Read Wagon concluded the Play & Learn programs at the South San Community Center and Claude Black Center. The series at the South San Community Center was very poorly attended. Possible reasons for such a low response include scheduling the series too close to the winter holidays and difficulty reaching parents who do not have regular internet access.

The series at the Claude Black Center was well-attended and filled the conference room that was made available for the program. Two representatives from the Eastside Promise Neighborhood attended a program and shared video and photos of the event on Facebook. Although the series had good attendance, there was very little participation from residents in the immediate area.

Play & Learn at the Woodlawn Wi-Fi Room began with a sizeable group of families, including several new participants, on February 10. The weather was excellent and allowed for several outdoor activities as well as quiet stations inside the space. Julia Selwyn, Central Reference, will join Little Read Wagon on February 17 to share information about databases and other library resources for parents.

Workshops for Early Childhood Professionals

Ms. Sanchez presented a break-out session at the January 17 Early Childhood Resource and Training Fair. Ms. Huber, Ms. Gonzalez, Ms. Huff, Mr. Webb and Liliana Ornelas presented another Music and More Early Literacy Moves workshop on January 31 at Central Library. Participants included a music teacher who was very happy to have a workshop topic so relevant to her work. Other participants also enjoyed learning new songs, building their knowledge of the connections between music, movement and early literacy, and the make-and-take. Jorge Ochoa again led a drumming session demonstrating how to use drumming to teach syllabication, shapes, colors and more. The optional HealthRhythms session after the workshop had more participants that ever as Mr. Ochoa facilitated a stress reduction exercise.

TEEN SERVICES (SYSTEM-WIDE)

Off-Site Service

Kathleen Fordyce (Teen Services Librarian II) and Caroline Mossing (Teen Services Librarian I) visited the Academy of Creative Education—each on a separate occasion—to present information to students about the Library's programs and resources for teens and to provide ACE students with library cards.

Partnerships

San Antonio Food Bank

To fulfill one of the Food Bank's Kids Café requirements, Kathleen Fordyce and Regina Almanza (Teen Services Library Assistant) attended the monthly nutrition lesson at the Food Bank on February 10. Teen Services staff incorporates what they learn from these nutrition lessons in teen programming at the Central Library.

Inspire U

Staff involved in the Inspire U Workplace Mentoring Program through Big Brothers Big Sisters of South Texas (part of SA2020), met with their "littles" in the Central Library Auditorium on January 26 for their monthly lunch. Kathleen Fordyce continues to serve as the liaison for this program.

Professional Development & Programming

The Teen Services Librarians and Liaisons met at the Central Library on February 11. Caroline Mossing provided a training in which everyone was able to try out different tech activities at five different work stations. These activities are part of the Teen Tech Week program menu that Teen Services will offer

during March 8-14. The librarians and liaisons will be able to pick one of the programs from the menu or facilitate a program of their own during Teen Tech Week.

MARKETING COMMUNICATIONS

Graphic Design

Ana and Giselle continued to work on special promotions for Black History Month, Women's History Month and Teen Tech Week (happening in March), Love Your Central Library Day, LEARN at SAPL and Summer Reading Program materials and materials in preparation for the new District 2 library.

Public Relations

Marcie and Joseph participated in the planning and production of the Black History Month Premiere event featuring Donna Brazile at the Carver Community Cultural Center that took place on January 22. Marcie prepared and participated in the filming of Cover to Cover on TVSA. Marcie also participated in the planning and production of Heart Central Library Day and she secured advertising with The Rivard Report for Black History Month.

She continues to train other departments on how to use the Digital Library Community Project wallpaper and she secured and facilitated a live radio interview on KROV FM about Black History Month. She worked on securing and facilitating an interview with Local Community News about the opening of the Encino Branch Library in May 2015. Marcie also secured and facilitated a meeting with Steve Bennett with the Express News regarding the 20th Anniversary of Central Library.

Social Media & Special Programs

Joseph continues to promote SAPL events and special programs on social media and continuously increases outreach opportunities. Joseph also spent the reporting period working on all details related to the website's redesign, creating the weekly "Weekends at SAPL" and the monthly "SAPL News & Events" electronic newsletters. He also wrote three blogs and prepared articles for the Friends of SAPL, Dot Gov and eConnections city newsletters.

CHILDREN'S SERVICES

The addition of Bilingual Story Time to the Central Children's Department programming list has been a wonderful one. Nohemi Lopez Rosdahl (Collection Development Librarian) has been leading the sessions

which began in January. Cross-training has begun with other Central Children's staff members. The Department is already learning a great deal more about how to lead a successful bilingual program for early language learners. Themes of focus have been colors, counting, friendship and food. The group has grown as has the Department's use of the Spanish language. The work has led the group to create a variety of Bilingual Book Bundles.

Kate Simpson (Assistant Manager) led the St. Luke's School students in their annual second grade tour of the Central Library. The children learned about all of the art work on display in the Library and received an introduction to the public library system when they received their very own library cards. Their school's librarian, Mary Milligan, reported that the children raved about their visit to the Library for days after the tour and the staff saw many of them return with their parents the following weekend to enjoy the Family Fun program and to browse the children's collection at their leisure. Other tours led this month by Ms. Simpson and Ruth Chiego (Manager) were provided to The Suburban School, The School for Inquiry and Creativity, The Winston School, and the Downtown YMCA Youth Corps.

During her Family Fun program, Ms. Simpson introduced the concept of fine art and still life drawings with a reading of several new children's books about Frida Kahlo and books celebrating personal expression through art. The families viewed a slideshow of famous still lifes throughout many periods of art history before retiring to the work stations to try their hand at still life drawing using oil pastels. Each table featured an arrangement of fresh flowers and a bowl of fruit for artistic study. Many of the children made more than one drawing, so that they could take one home and leave one for display in the Story Room's Art Gallery. Finally, the families came together to create a three dimensional masterpiece collage of a vibrantly colorful vase of flowers made with tissue paper. In celebration of National Take Your Child to the Library Day, Simpson created an experience highlighting the special role of libraries in the community and celebrating the love of reading. She shared stories about inspiring librarians which also featured a variety of creatures enjoying the library. Then everyone gathered for an interactive library-themed guessing game in which information about how the library works was shared in a fun (Jeopardy-style) way. The families then worked together to create a variety of elaborate bookmarks to take home. Before departing, the children had a blast "playing librarian" with a pretend play zone, where they could look up books in the cardboard computer, call for shelf checks on the play phone and stamp pretend library cards for eager patrons on the other side of the play desk.

As part of the Central Library-wide program, *Heart Central Library*, the Central Children's Department celebrated Valentine's Day with a special bash featuring a variety of heart-shaped and love-themed craft. Jasmin Salinas (Librarian) met party-goers on a child-sized dance floor as they danced away to several Motown favorites. A collaborative art piece greeted visitors and encouraged participants to express all the things they loved in the world. The celebration was capped off with a raucous "I Love the Library" parade where children and their adults wore their heart hats and made their presence known while ringing bells and shaking shaker eggs. A few brave adults even joined the merry band with tambourines! A Valentine's Day-related celebration was also enjoyed by Play & Learn participants. Amy Lewis (Librarian) created a red-themed extravaganza which featured a large red fire engine for children to hop into. Serendipitously, two large boxes were donated to the Department, and Ms. Lewis was able to create two large vehicles using paint and ingenuity. A fire truck and a school bus were the end result. Due to the very popular "community helpers" themes at the early childhood centers who visit us each year, the Department knows these will get a lot of use throughout the year!

Besides all the Book Bundles on display and ready for checkout, the Children's Department has an interactive display on view through the spring. It features "Doors To Imagination" through which visitors can guess the title of a book by looking at the picture clues inside the door frames. School age tour groups have especially enjoyed the game and many children have returned with their parents to the Children's floor to experience it again.

DIGITAL SERVICES

Sierra Mendez and Veronica Rodriguez refreshed the Storytime Stampede on February 7 at the Kampmann Portal, moving to a setup using theme-based book and activity stations. Ms. Mendez and Ms.

Rodriquez also complete a proposal for the StoryCorps@yourlibrary project and submitted the application in early February.

REFERENCE

Reference staff continues to promote the Library through programs and outreach. The Library also functions as an intermediary or resource for patrons to other governmental agencies or services.

Due to cuts in Internal Revenue Service funding, the paper tax forms available to the public from the Library (and other entities) have been significantly reduced. To assist colleagues James Laferla prepared a script outlining the changes and providing other options for the public to access IRS forms. The relevant LibGuide was also updated by Mr. Laferla and Blanca Hernandez and includes information on available tax help in the community.

On January 21, Pannaga Prasad and Diana Starrett gave a presentation at the San Antonio Botanical Center to approximately 100 retired teachers. Ms. Prasad and Ms. Starrett focused on library services available to seniors. In appreciation for the presentation, the San Antonio Area Retired Teachers Association (SAARTA) donated money for scholarships in honor of the Library.

Tricia Masterson presented the movie, "Lucy" for Central Cinema on February 1; an overwhelming 76 patrons attended.

Matt De Waelsche, Texana Archivist, received a donation (approximately 12 cubic feet of material) from the Beacon Hill Area Neighborhood Association Archives.

On February 3, Deborah Countess conducted a genealogy class entitled, 'Getting Started with Familysearch.org'. Some attendees found "missing" ancestors before the class ended!

The Texas Historical Records Advisory Board (THRAB) held their meeting in Texana on February 9. State Librarian, Mark Smith and State Archivist, Jelain Chubb attended in addition to other state-wide members. Members and guests received a tour of San Antonio Public Library's "Vault Treasures".

The 'Love Central Library Day' event on February 14 – Valentine's Day - came from an idea germinated in the Central Library is for Everyone (CLIFE) Committee. Reference staff coordinated with already scheduled programming in the Children's and Teens Departments to promote and feature activities throughout Central.

To help promote the celebration, Texana's Sylvia Reyna designed and curated a display of Harry Hertzberg's historic Victorian Valentine Collection. Texana staff made up 100 bags with "goodies" to hand out, with the tag line: "Love Your Family! How did your parents meet? Learn more on the 6th Floor! Come do Genealogy!"

Fiction Team members Cristine Mitchamore, Tricia Masterson and Blanca Hernandez coordinated activities and events on Central's 2nd and 5th Floors. At the Central Library Atrium, patrons enjoyed 'Historic Scottish Country Dancing'. Near the Fiction Collection, staff hosted a 'Romance Readers Social' to celebrate and talk about an often maligned genre.

In the Lobby area on 1st Floor, Rolando Casias performed romantically-inspired songs on his own hand-built classical guitars.

Paula Davis facilitated the presentation of Romantic Comedies shown (without sound) in the Connect Training Center.



Weekly Programs

Mondays with JD Elizondo (Library Assistant): JD continued his weekly Eclectic Electric program, in which teens learn to play guitar and/or keyboards. Teens can also teach their peers to play. After the music ends, teens engage in different weekly craft projects.

Tuesdays with Caroline Mossing (Librarian I): During the reporting period, Caroline hosted Science and Tech Tuesdays. Teens examined the effects of chemical compounds on the color of flame and used a supersaturated solution to create crystallized ornaments. They also learned about the functions of quadcopters and had the opportunity to pilot one, compensating for wind and considering their surroundings. Teens built desktop catapults and compared trajectories and accuracy of different materials and structures.

Wednesdays with Kathleen Fordyce (Librarian II): On Wednesday nights, teens pick their favorite video or board game and engage in friendly competition with their peers. In addition, teens have the opportunity to express their creative side by participating in craft or art projects of their choosing. During the previous reporting period teens asked for particular board games to be purchased. The teens got their wish and were able to play an epic game of Bananagrams one Wednesday evening, as well as some of the other newly acquired games.

Thursdays with Regina Almanza (Library Assistant): During the reporting period at Teen Services, teens continued participating in programs that they suggested or that encouraged peer-to-peer assistance, artistic expression, and coordination. On the day before National Pie Day, teens made pies, either hot or cold, that required selecting ingredients based on taste and compatibility. The results were amazing and the interaction between the teens involved labeling other's pie as most inventive, prettiest, and looks tastiest. Craft time for the following Thursday was nail polish marble art which involved nail polish, water, and bamboo skewers. Teens dropped nail polish in water then sunk paper, a canvas or paper box in the water for the nail polish to adhere to the item. When asked if anyone had done the activity before, one teen girl yelled out, "I have," as she raced to the table guickly to demonstrate to the others. To celebrate Heart Health Month, teens had a trail mix 'n match night where they tasted various items such as dried fruits, nuts, and cereals and spices to include in their own person bag of trail mix. As per request, teens also made beadsprites. To celebrate Valentine's Day, one teen asked if it would be possible to make Valentine cookies. Teens made the dough, rolled and cut out shapes and baked them in toaster ovens. They then decorated their cookies with a selection of colored icings. One teen used his dough to make cookies as gift to give school friends. After most craft programs have concluded, in a non-competitive environment, teens played video games. Special Saturday program: In celebration of Valentine's Day, teens made bath fizzies by harnessing a chemical reaction and used conductive tape and LEDs to hack their valentines. This teen event was part of the larger ♥Central Library Day celebration on February 14.

Tours and Groups

Students from a poetry class at Lanier High School visited Teen Services on January 23 to look at poetry resources that had been pulled for them and to peruse poetry and literature databases. Two classes from the Henry Ford Academy reserved computers in Teen Services on February 2 for research purposes. Seventh and eighth grade students from St. Peter Prince of Apostles School were given a tour of the library and catalog and database instruction on February 4.



BRANCH LOCATIONS

BAZAN

Children's Librarian, Hope Sonnen began a Book Club with five Kindergarten children at J.T. Brackenridge Elementary. With two sessions completed so far, Ms. Sonnen reports that these new readers were very excited to participate and enjoyed taking turns reading and answering questions about the book they read. She continues to lead Book Clubs at three more schools.

As a host site for the free tax preparation service, VITA, the Bazan branch saw increased traffic and an opportunity to welcome new customers.

Metro Health continues to use the branch as outreach location for its public health initiatives.

Academia America-Citizenship classed continued with very good attendance. The classes are conducted by Academia América, a non-profit organization based in San Antonio that provides tuition-free citizenship education programs and referral services to immigrants, and legal residents who are eligible to apply for U.S. citizenship

ACA enrollment assistance was made available at the Bazan branch during this year's enrollment period. Enrollment specialists from SRA International were on hand to provide one-on-one assistance to individuals seeking to renew or enroll in health insurance.

BROOK HOLLOW

On January 28, Brook Hollow welcomed back a popular monthly program: Steampunk 101. This event offers novices and steampunk aficionados alike a glimpse into this growing trend. The clockwork studded world of steampunk combines a literary genre with an aesthetic sensibility. Attendees are treated to presentations on the history of steampunk, DIY costuming, and an entrée into a welcoming community. Brook Hollow Children's Department completed a thorough weeding of grubby Juvenile Awards books. Consultation with Nohemi Rosdahl led to a system-wide plan to weed and re-order popular Award books. Librarian Rachael Barrera is spearheading the system-wide effort.

On February 3, Brook Hollow hosted another highly successful Play and Learn. The 84 attendees experienced many Valentine's Day themed activities, as well as activities about penguins and ice, to support the day's read aloud book *Penguin in Love* by Salina Yoon. Kids and parents enjoyed sensory bins with Kool Aid dyed rice and Valentine's trinkets, a penguin/fish beanbag toss, heart shaped ice painting, Valentine's Day cards, a fizzy ice heart science experiment, a heart numeral matching game with dice, and a pretend flower shop, as well as other activities.

Brook Hollow's recently added Wednesday afternoon Baby Time appears to be picking up steam with a few extra attendees every week.

Teen Time attendance at Brook Hollow has picked up in the last few weeks. On January 26th the teens were happy to see the variety of board games available and enjoyed a lively game of 'Apples to Apples'.

The next week the teens chose to watch some anime and watched episodes of "Soul Eater", "Bleach" and started the first half of "Cowboy BeBop: The Movie", finishing on February 9. Refreshments of popcorn, cookies and beverages generously provided by the Friends were enjoyed.

CARVER

Learn @ SAPL opened unofficially on January 27. Patrons who were eager to learn job skills, work on their resumes or improve their computer skills made sure to visit the new facility. Though the center is barely a month old, Training Officer Jeanne Johnson already has a slate of regular visitors. Kenneth Franklin, Department of Human Services, has joined the center as a case worker.

Black History Month at Carver Branch included screenings of films highlighting African American culture and themes. San Antonio artist Bernice Williams decked the walls of the Prudence Curry Meeting Room with colorful quilts with intricate patterns, illustrating the tradition of quilting passed down by our grandmothers. The quilts are the handiwork of her students who meet for art instruction at the District 2 Senior Center.

The meeting room was packed solid on February 12 for Back to My Roots: Natural Styles Workshop. The event attracted more than fifty audience members. On February 14th historian and travel enthusiast Nias Harris offered a special symposium on the wonders of Africa. Mr. Harris spent weeks visiting different parts of the continent before returning with images and artifacts to share with his audience. His interactive program attracted just over fifty people. SAPL Board member Gloria Malone and members of the Ivy Readers Book Club that day presented the branch with a three-volume collection of African American history in memory of deceased member Dorothy Friday, a longtime San Antonio educator.

In honor of Valentine's Day, the branch hosted an hour of poetry read by area writers. Afterward, guests sat down to a dinner of gumbo, fresh-baked cornbread and ice tea prepared by Ma Harper's Creole Kitchen.

For the second year in a row, the branch featured A Date with a Book which, once again, proved to be a hit with customers.

Assistant Manager Monty Holcomb, acting as Carver's Teen Services Liaison, hosted four Teen Time events with the Wii game system. Mr. Holcomb initiated Chess Night and has held four events thus far. In addition, he started a Mayor's Book Club group at the District 2 Senior Center session and has so far facilitated two book club meetings.

Branch Manager DL Grant Jr. represented the branch at Family Literacy Night at S.J. Davis Middle School on Feb. 10.

CODY

Spidey, Batman, Superman and Wonder Woman were in attendance at Cody's *Superheroes' Extravaganza* on January 22. Sheila Acosta, Children's Librarian, read superhero stories. The children then formed teams for some fun challenges and feats, which earned them various prizes. Sheila also provided a variety of superhero crafts to make and to take with them. Refreshments were served to end the "super-fun" evening.

Lego Club enthusiasts teamed up on January 27 to earn top recognition for the Lego competition presented by Sheila Acosta. The theme was a favorite fairy tale or fable, and the children did not disappoint, with creations from Jack and the Beanstalk, and Little Red Riding Hood. Tween Book Club members met on January 29 to discuss the book of the month- Elvis and the Underdogs by Jenny Lee. Sheila Acosta presented a unique discussion technique by providing a

challenge to the attendees that involved tossing a pair of cardboard dice which contained names and items from the book. The tweens then had to describe various scenes or events to match the dice. Sheila booked-talked newly arrived books which the Tweens were then able to check out.

Collins Garden hosted the Scholastic Van, which was a rare treat. The children definitely enjoyed all the van had to offer – all sorts of activities to encourage reading and literacy. Every visitor to the van received a free book to take home and enjoy. Even shoppers from the HEB across the street came over to visit the van.

Collins Garden once again hosted Early Voting for area runoff elections. Turnout was low the first part of the week but the last day saw a large number of citizens coming in to cast their ballots.

The staff at Collins are preparing for a major makeover. Craft supplies are being carefully inventoried and arrangements are being made for storage during the summer months. The craft cart in the children's area is stocked with everything needed to show off someone's artistic side. This month artists of all ages created snowmen or snow women, bird's nests, and valentine cards. Staff noted an

increase in visitors on Friday mornings and afternoons since the crafting activity was added to the day's offerings.

Students interested in public service careers got a peek into a day in the life of a children's librarian. Circulation Attendant Patricia Perez continued to host Bilingual story time. The program started 2015 with winter stories. Ms. Perez presented three bilingual story times in January. Bilingual story time participants enjoyed making bear puppets as a craft activity.

MAVERICK

The staff at Maverick worked very hard to increase its circulation for the month of January. It certainly paid off, as the branch had a 6.5 % increase in items circulated in January 2015, compared to January 2014!

Many programs occurred during the reporting period. On January 31, 15 attendees came to the Ladies Choice Book Club. Children's Librarian, Amy Roberts, had 61 children attend her Valentine story times on February 9. She had a Lego program on February 14. Thank you to the Maverick Friends who provided funds for Legos for the branch. Teen Liaison/Library Assistant, Lucy Villa, recruited several new teens who now attend Teen Time on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Training and committee work also took place during the reporting period. Librarian II, Ben Longoria, attended a Jobs and Small Business Committee on January 27. Ms. Roberts attended an Early Literacy Committee meeting on January 28. In addition, Ms. Roberts participated in a webinar about "Dia De Los Niños y Niñas" on February 10.

In other news, Library Aide, Elizabeth Santos, resigned on February 4. Her co-workers wish her well in her new job at Frost Bank. Also, Maverick participated in Early Voting February 9-13. Thank you to the staff that opened early and stayed late.

McCRELESS

The Movie Time showing of Maleficent on January 10 attracted a good audience of 14 individuals.

Teen Time is back in full swing on Wednesday nights. The branch is averaging 15-20 teens each week. The branch had two *Book a Librarian* sessions (one-on-one help for tech issues) in February. Both patrons received assistance in utilizing Overdrive on their mobile devices.

Four Story Times were held. Topics included cold- weather clothing, losing things, friendship and the moon. Children made mittens, an Eskimo picture, and painted a water-color moon. They also enjoyed singing, dancing, acting out rhymes, and playing together.

Of the four Family Fun programs, themes included automobile engineering, Australia, and Valentine's Day. A Read-to-a-Dog program was held for the first time. Children enjoyed reading and snuggling with Chesney, a book-loving border collie.

A second grade class and their families visited the library for a tour. Many students received their first library card and used it to check out materials for a class research project.

The Friends of McCreless have enjoyed success from their contribution of a passive on-going book sale cart. They are making regular collections of contributions to benefit the branch. One project they are working on is doing some landscaping in the front garden.

The branch is partnering with Metro Health to offer anonymous HIV and syphilis testing once a month in the meeting room.

MEMORIAL

Memorial Branch Children's Librarian, Trina Smith was invited to speak at Woodlawn Hills Elementary Literacy Night where she shared information about library services, programs and resources with parents and students. As a member of the Early Literacy Committee, she also helped to prepare activity learning kits for branch libraries that will host upcoming Play and Learn programs. Ms. Smith was nominated as Chairperson for the Children's Round Table Committee under the Texas Library Association.

Memorial was one of several branch libraries that were honored to host a performance by violinist, Mary Ellen Goree from the San Antonio Symphony Orchestra. This special Family Fun program was well attended. The families of Memorial Library also enjoyed celebrating Valentine's Day during Family Fun by playing games, listening to stories and making crafts.

A reception for an art exhibit entitled *Lifescapes* was held on January 22. The artist, Carlton C. Gilder, who is also an Air Force veteran, has many works and commissions to his credit including paintings done for the Marriott Rivercenter. Generally a portrait specialist, his repertoire includes landscapes, animals and paintings of famous persons, such as Michael Jackson. Special thanks to the Friends of the Memorial library for sponsoring the reception.

The Memorial branch welcomed many customers as it hosted Affordable Care Act enrollment assistance and served as an Early Voting site for the Special Runoff Election.

MISSION

A musical performance by *The San Antonio Youth Wind Ensembles*, a program related to Black History month and The Mayor's Book Club, was held on Saturday February 2. The ensemble's performance was held in the library proper with an attendance of 32.

Fitness in the Park; yoga and cycle circuit classes has been well received. Weather permitting, the Saturday afternoon family-friendly yoga sessions are hosted outdoors in the Library's North courtyard. Participants have expressed their appreciation of the accommodating space.

Ongoing programs include table tennis for adults, Cult and Classic movies, Trivia Game night and a weekly Chess Club.

Continuing partnership includes: Affordable Care Act enrollment, Familias en Accion and San Antonio Film Community. Mission continues to serve as a VITA site and Academia America began another round of citizenship classes on January 26.

Teen Time participants enjoyed a variety of arts and crafts for the reporting period. Teens also enjoyed a pizza party, courtesy of the Mission Friends, to celebrate Valentine's Day. Teen Anime Club made candy creations that were enjoyed by all. Mission Video Game Club youth participated in video gaming as well as card and board games. St. Peter's St. Joseph's Children's Home visited the branch with a group of teens and teachers to tour and learn about teen services. Teen programming had 9 programs and 192 in attendance.

Mission has begun conducting tours and library instruction for groups of Harlandale parents and teachers. The district received a grant that included making connections with the public libraries. During one of the tours a teacher was impressed to see the library's Braille collection as she has a student who has limited

access to Braille materials. Children's Librarian Jane Miller contacted both Harlandale ISD and SAISD departments of assistance for visual impairments. Both school districts have expressed an interest in using the library's Braille offerings.

For a Valentine's Day celebration, the Mission Toddlers had their very own party. Over 60 excited children and parents listened to stories, ate snacks, and made Valentine's crafts to the tune of party music. The special celebration was enjoyed by all.

PAN AMERICAN

The Pan American Branch Library continued to provide both educational and recreational services to the south side community. During the months of January and February the branch hosted fitness classes such as Gentle Stretch Yoga and Tai Chi, Easy, which have proven to be very popular with patrons. Additionally, the branch offered quilting classes on Thursday mornings for beginners and all skill levels.

Children's Services Librarian Carol Collins visited the Alamo Leadership Academy on January 26 to brief the school staff on the resources available on mysapl.org. On February 12, Ms. Collins delivered to the school 40 books on great Black American and the solar system. Additionally that day, Ms. Collins instructed the third and fourth graders on using SAPL's Primary Search database and searching google.com.

As part of a grant funded project to promote children's literacy, parents from the Rayburn and Columbia Heights Elementary Schools participated in Story Time and Toddler Time at Pan American on January 27. Afterwards, the parents and teachers were given a tour of the branch.

In January and February, Pan American Branch Library offered fun and creative activities for teens in the community. Programs included Wii Gaming, board games, and fun crafts. Teens at Pan American on February 2 got the chance to paint Any Warhol-esq collages with their own pictures. Just in time for Valentine's Day, teens created love rocks that featured either a painted picture or a message to friends and family.

PARMAN

Library Assistant Christina Hess represented Parman Library at the Be Well Health & Wellness Event held in the Stone Oak area in January. She spoke to numerous attendees about what Parman has to offer all ages.

Several staff members attended the Staff Recognition Breakfast held at the Central Library. Senior Circulation Attendant Megan Stanley and Library Assistant Christina Hess were invited because they both received Customer Service awards over the last year. Branch Manager Haley Holmes and Teen Librarian Marisa DeBow attended as nominators.

The Library Board of Trustees meeting was held at Parman for the first time. The Friends of the Parman Library provided refreshments and sent a representative to help with set up. Branch Manager Haley Holmes gave a video presentation highlighting branch events over the last year and interviews with community members.

Children's Librarian Carrie Vance hosted Saturday with the Symphony on February 7. The event was held in the library and was both well attended and well received. Ms. Vance also held the first meeting of the Parman Knitting Club. Adults of all levels are invited to attend every Sunday at 2pm. She hopes to extend the program to children in the future.

The Friends of the Parman Library held their first meeting of the year and approved a spending budget as well as a wish list presented by Ms. Holmes. The first purchase of the year will be a larger fish tank for the circulation desk. Goldfish Biscuit and Gravey will be turning 2 soon and have outgrown their current tank.

PRUITT

Great ideas abound from the addition of a fourth and new book club at the Pruitt Library. Children's Librarian, Cynthia Saenz, held the inaugural meeting of the "Family Circle" Book Club. This book club is for both the parent and the tween child, ages 9-12, and promotes character building, literacy skills development, and demonstrates the value of reading. Parents are surprised by thoughts and interpretations their children get from reading the same text. The children are happy that their parent is taking an active role in a leisure activity that they can do together. The tweens celebrated dental awareness month by creating tooth pillows and having a healthy snack of apples smiles.

Pruitt teens remembered and honored Martin Luther King, Jr. by using an interactive website to view and listen to the "I Have a Dream" speech. Teens expressed that it was as relevant today as it was 50 years ago by mentioning today's current events, like the Ferguson riots. As teens are so dynamic, moving from a more serious topic to one of the heart, the last Teen Time activity brought out the love bug as almost 100 teens stopped by the library to create layered sand art heart necklaces for Valentine's Day.

The Pruitt community celebrated Black History Month by joining forces with the Mayor's Book Club and reading *Twelve Years a Slave*. "The Book Was Better" Book Club, where members discuss both the book and the movie, also read the book and discussed the differences between the book and film. The TGIF Book Club read poet, author, civil rights activist, Maya Angelou's *I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings*. Continuing the celebration of Black History Month, on Saturdays in February, Pruitt Library is showing family-friendly movies and serving popcorn and cold drinks.

SAN PEDRO

Children's Librarian Betsy Dalton presented monthly story times to children at Educare Child Care Center (two classes), Study Hall Learning Center (two classes), and Monte Vista Montessori (two classes). Fifteen books were also delivered to each child care class for their use during the month. She also presented a monthly story time to two groups of children (each group was a combination of two classes) at Respite Care, a child care facility for developmentally disabled children. Books were left for each of five classes. In addition, she presents a special weekly story time at the library for some of the children who live at Respite Care's shelter facility.

On February 4 a group of children enjoyed creating with LEGOs and DUPLOs on LEGO Day at the Library. Ms. Betsy challenged them to build an igloo out of LEGOs. The children rose to the challenge!

Ms. Betsy presents a weekly Kids Time for Kindergarten through 5th grade students. On February 11's Kids Time, the children and Ms. Betsy went outside in the park to observe and record their observations about some of the trees in San Pedro Park. They then did bark rubbings of the trees they observed. When they got back to the library they created their own individual books to take home that contained their observations, tree rubbings, and pictures they drew of the trees and other park denizens, such as squirrels!

During this period, Ms. Betsy facilitated monthly books discussions at Monte Vista Montessori (4th) and Hawthorne Academy (4th and 5th grades) book clubs. The book clubs have 12 members each. The book clubs meet during the students' lunch period in the school library where the books read the previous month are discussed. In addition, Ms. Betsy facilitates the Great Hearts 4th grade book club which meets monthly at the library.

Monte Vista Montessori brings approximately 50 students once a month to the library. These students range in age from eight to thirteen, grades 2 through 8. When the class comes to the library, the Children's Librarian spends approximately thirty minutes with the students, suggesting books and helping them navigate the Dewey Decimal system, place holds, use the catalog and databases, and locate materials.

Library Assistant Carmen Roja created bulletin boards and displays for Black History Month and Valentine's Day.

SEMMES

The Friends of the Semmes Branch Library held their first book sale of 2015 on February 6-7. Friday morning, the group set up the sale in the meeting room and held a preview sale for Friends members from 10:00 am until 11:30 pm. On Saturday morning, the sale started at 10:00 am and went until they sold out of merchandise. Between the sale and donations, the Friends made about \$1,200. The staff is preparing a wish list of items for the Friends to purchase.

Semmes Library patrons were treated to a performance by a San Antonio Symphony musician on Saturday, January 24. Children and adults alike enjoyed the bassoon playing of Sharon Kuster. Ms. Kuster shared information about the history of the bassoon and gave specific information about her particular instrument (it costs more than most cars!) She also talked about the San Antonio Symphony and their upcoming programs.

There was a special Family Fun event on February 12. Everyone who attended was treated to a Valentine Party. Many staff members were involved in preparing for, setting up, and running the party, including Children's Librarians Randi Jones and Shannon Seglin, Library Assistant Melody Smith and Library Aide Margaret Timm. 41 people attended the party and enjoyed stories, party games, crafts, and refreshments.

THOUSAND OAKS

Children's Activities

Children who came to Story Time on February 12 celebrated Valentine's Day with stories and activities including heart crafts, and heart-shaped bean bag toss and cookie decorating. The party was lots of fun and the kids and their parents had a great time. Many children's programs this year have featured winter themes, and activities have included snow made from baking soda and hair conditioner; and making snowflakes out of salt, glitter and glue. At her monthly outreach to a local daycare on February 11, Children's Librarian Leslie Elsasser read Valentine's Day stories to three groups of children.

Book Groups

On February 2 the MnM (Monday Night Multimedia) group met. We discussed the book The All Girl Filling Station's Last Reunion by Fannie Flagg which everyone enjoyed. We also discussed other books and various movies, as well as the sport of pickleball. Five folks attended.

The Thursday Afternoon Book Club met on January 22 to discuss the book, *Where'd You Go, Bernadette,* by Maria Semple. Mixed reviews reigned supreme, with some members enjoying the whimsical novel, but a few members found it downright silly (and one just plain awful). Yummy treats were provided, which took some of the sting out of the disappointment for the members who were not particularly thrilled with the title.

Programming/Events/Outreach

The Gaming for Adults group met on February 9, with three people attending to play 'Gloom'.

VITA commenced at Thousand Oaks on January 20, with the service being provided five days a week. After a slow few first days, the lines for the service have been long and constant. A taxing time of the year for Thousand Oaks staff and VITA volunteers alike, the program is hugely popular with the community, and introduces the branch to many people who normally do not visit Thousand Oaks.

TOBIN AT OAKWELL

Librarian, Keri Moczygemba has accepted the manager position at the new Encino branch. Ms. Moczygemba is splitting time between Tobin duties and Encino while anxiously awaiting the opening of the building, which all staff is very appreciative of her continued assistance.

Children's Librarian, Shannon Seglin, from Semmes has seen Toddler Time double in attendance since she began filling in at the branch with her original and enthusiastic programming. Thanks to Children's Coordinator, Viki Ash, over 55 kids and adults of ages enjoyed a delightful performance by the San Antonio Symphony violinist Amy Venticinque on February 7.

Teen Librarian, Matthew Loaiza, has added a second weekly teen time due to demand. Then teens built an impressive three foot roller coaster with Konex pieces over two weeks that is on display for all visitors to see.

Library Assistant, Elvia Ramos, continues outreach at Northeast Service Center partnering with Thousand Oaks branch on this effort. In addition, Ms. Ramos is leading the outreach programming at Stonebrook Manor on Broadway and had an exuberant crowd with her monthly visit this period.

WESTFALL

In early February, Westfall Learn Center Training Officer Deborah Carter made a presentation at the Texas Association for Literacy and Adult Education conference in Houston. After hearing Deborah, several adult educators from other Texas cities expressed interest in setting up similar programs. Educators from San Antonio said they plan to stop by Westfall to discuss opportunities for collaboration.

In January Westfall's Learn @SAPL Center assisted 292 people and held 29 classes attended by 162 people. Of those utilizing the Learn @SAPL Center 97% said they made progress toward their daily learning goal.

Lindsay Minarovic, the DHS social worker assigned to the Learn @SAPL Center, has been working to become a financial empowerment counselor. Once certified, Lindsay will be able to provide free, one-on-one financial counseling to help patrons: take control of debt; deal with debt collectors; improve credit; build savings; create a budget, and; find safe and affordable financial products.


