DIRECTOR'S OFFICE

Reception for Latino Collection and Resource Center

The San Antonio Public Library Foundation's Latino Leadership for the Library (L3) Committee and the San Antonio Public Library unveiled plans for the new Latino Collection and Resource Center at the Central Library on Wednesday, October 14. This project is being initiated in partnership with the San Antonio Public Library Foundation and the Latino Leadership for the Library (L3) Committee. The event was well attended and the audience heard from Councilman Roberto Treviño, State Poet Laureate Carmen Tafolla, local author John Philip Santos and local scholar and author Dr. Tomas Ybarra y Frausto.

Library invited to participate in District 6 National Night Out Tour

Councilman Ray Lopez invited the Library to join his tour on National Night Out (October 6) of District 6 Neighborhoods. Library Services Administrator Candelaria Mendoza joined Councilman Lopez's tour and provided information to residents regarding the future Potranco Branch Library, located within a YMCA, as well as information about Library services and resources.

Launch of Mayor's Book Club

Mayor Taylor and the San Antonio Public Library launched the Mayor's Book Club on Friday, October 9, featuring the "Boy Kings of Texas," a book by Domingo Martinez. The event took place at Central Library and included a brief program. Copies of the book are available throughout the Library system and as an eBook.

Delegation from Seattle visits Central Library

The San Antonio Public Library hosted the Director of the Seattle Public Library Marcellus Turner and his administrative team, as well as their President of the Board of Trustees, as part of a site visit to San Antonio to gather information about San Antonio Public Library's efforts in the areas of digital services, collection development, building projects, and age-based services.

The purpose of the site visit by the Seattle Public Library team was to learn from the San Antonio Public Library staff our strategies in the area of: community responsive programs; digital services; marketing to and serving children, teens and millennials; investments in network infrastructure; collaborative meeting room technology with telepresence capabilities; online Library card registration; selection trends and the continued growth in our digital collection.

The San Antonio Public Library is building a reputation as a national leader in early childhood literacy, teen services, and digital services. SAPL's innovative approach to patron services has been recognized by the American Library Association, the Urban Libraries Council, the Library Journal and others.

Meeting with District 3 Councilwoman Rebeca Viagran

Library Director Ramiro Salazar was joined by Tracey Bennett, President and CEO Of the Library Foundation and Katy Flato, Director of the San Antonio Book Festival, for a follow-up visit with Councilwoman Viagran regarding her inquiry for opportunities to bring the San Antonio Book Festival to the Mission Drive-in Plaza. It was agreed that that Library Department would work with the Department for Culture and Creative Development to plan a literary event/program in mid-March 2016 as a way to create anticipation for the San Antonio Book Festival which is scheduled for April 2, 2016.

New public copy, print scanning and faxing system

The Library is in the process of implementing the new public printing, copying, scanning and faxing system in October per the approved project plan and service contract. The first step visible to the public has been the user testing at the Semmes Branch Library. The small dedicated children's computer area has been converted to the new system and customer volunteers have helped the staff test the new services and system. The main computer area at the Semmes Branch (20 computers) provides uninterrupted service on the current Documentation system and customers have been directed to the main computer area if they do not wish to try the new system. Signage was placed on site in advance of the testing period, which started on October 2, for approximately one week. Staff has been available during the entire testing period for questions and customer support.

Library hosts first San Antonio Mini Maker Faire at Central Library

On October 17, 2015 (11 am - 4 pm), the Central Library hosted a San Antonio Mini Maker Faire. The San Antonio Mini Maker Faire brought San Antonio into the global Maker movement, joining more than 150 cities from Tokyo to Milwaukee in celebrating our local creative culture. More than thirty (30) San Antonio area makers, from handweavers to hackers and robot engineers, showed off their work for the community through performances, hands-on activities, interactive exhibits, and workshops. San Antonio Public Library's Teen Services coordinated this all-ages event.

Sanchez will be representing San Antonio Public Library and will be the presenter at the conference. PLA is sponsoring her trip to deliver the presentation. Every Child Ready to Read is a national early literacy initiative.

Library staff delivers presentation during Library Journal Virtual Conference

The San Antonio Public Library continues to be sought-after to deliver presentations regarding service innovations. On October 14, Ignacio Albarracin, Digital Services Coordinator, was featured as presenter during a digital conference, *The Digital Shift*. The conference was billed as a resource to *explore how libraries connect communities like no other institution*. Albarracin presented on the Library's digital kiosk initiative at the San Antonio International Airport. The presentation was well received.

On September 21, Reference staff members were pleased to welcome Ashlee Chavez as the new Manager of Reference. Ms. Chavez was the Manager of the Igo Branch Library and serves on several system-wide committees, including Adult Summer Reading, the Staffing Study Phase II, and the Konica Minolta Public Printing Project.

On September 12, Cristine Mitchamore and on September 13, Tricia Masterson represented the Library at the Alamo City Comic Con. There was great fun for visitors and participants alike. Ms. Masterson enjoyed having pictures taken with favorite costumed heroes and superheroes. To celebrate the event, SAPL staff helped visitors make superhero-themed bookmarks, armbands, and masks.

Diana Starrett hosted the annual *Knit Out and Crochet Too!* on September 19. Entire families, including children and older adults, participated in this very popular craft.

Ms. Mitchamore participated in 'TalkBack Night' at the San Pedro Playhouse on September 24. After the performance of "Of Mice and Men," she joined the cast on stage to answer questions about the play, the book, and the differences between them.

The Reference Training Team (Dan Garcia, Maria Hernandez, Adolph Lopez, Tricia Masterson, Julia Selwyn) partnered with Vista Volunteer Molly McKenna to create and present a 'Connect to Tech' weekend on September 26 - 27. Attendees met in the Connect Training Room for several technology-related classes including Internet and Email Basics, Internet Safety, and Social Media.

On October 2, Pannaga Prasad and Sally Bauer attended the 11th Annual Health Literacy Conference at the La Quinta Medical Center. Health professionals discussed the role of health literacy in health outcomes and discussed the issue of health disparities in the community. The Library can be a valuable partner in meeting community needs in this area.

The Institute of Texan Cultures held a *Discover Your Roots Day* on September 13 and invited Texana Librarian Sylvia Reyna to participate in guiding visitors through the process of researching their family tree.

The Office of Historic Preservation asked SAPL's Texana Department to participate in their 7th annual *Historic Homeowners Fair*, held on September 19 at The Pearl. Ms. Reyna showcased the resources available to help people research the history and architecture of their homes. This is the sixth year SAPL has been asked to participate in the fair.

Matt De Waelsche presented *Preserving Family Treasures*, at Encino Branch Library on September 19, providing tips on how to ensure family heirlooms remain intact for generations to come.

On Sunday, September 20, Andy Crews guided the DIY students at Parman Branch Library through the use of HeritageQuest, a genealogy database similar to Ancestry that can be used remotely by SAPL cardholders.

Texana hosted two very well-attended programs honoring *Hispanic Heritage Month*. Ms. Reyna invited local artist Joe Lopez to speak about his experiences growing up in a *barrio* on the edge of Alamo

Heights. His September 22 presentation, *La Noche del Gallo*, discussed the cultural and ethnic influence of the times and how his experiences shaped the colorful and vibrant art he is known for today. On September 26, *La Historia del los Canarios en Tejas - The History of Canarians in Texas*, was hosted by Mr. De Waelsche and presented by Hector Pacheco, President of the Canary Islands Descendants Association of San Antonio. Mr. Pacheco discussed the history and impact of Canary Islanders in Texas from the 18th and 19th centuries to the present day.

Deborah Countess conducted the class *Useful Genealogy Tools: WorldCat & Interlibrary Loan*, on October 6. She focused on how using these databases could increase a researcher's access to the number of genealogy resources available, all without having to leave San Antonio.

Ms. Countess addressed patrons at Guerra Branch Library on October 16 about the basics of doing genealogy research. She introduced different strategies and methods for putting together a family tree and showed how the SAPL genealogy databases could help uncover the past.

DIGITAL SERVICES

MARKETING

The marketing department has participated in the planning and production of the Mayor's Book Club, the reception for the Latino Collection & Resource Center and of the first *San Antonio Mini Maker Faire* in San Antonio during the reporting period. Also, the department continued has promoted events for *Hispanic Heritage Month*.

Graphic Design

The graphic designers continued their work on materials for Mayor's Book Club, *Native American Heritage Month*, Low Vision, Otherness, Poetry Pueblo, Arts & Letters Wards, Jack Gantos and Sofia Segovia – in Spanish. The graphic work also included materials for events, including the Mini Maker Faire, Latino Collection event, Engineering Day, Potranco YMCA/SAPL facility, ads for the Rivard Report, Schaefer fundraising invitation, Strategic Plan booklet and info sheet.

Public Relations

Public Information Officer Marcie Hernandez booked and facilitated News 4 WOAI's segment *Where's Cleto?* at Brook Hollow Branch Library that aired on Friday, September 25. Also, Hernandez Booked and facilitated a segment on SA Live (KSAT 12) on Tuesday, September 29 to promote *Hispanic Heritage Month* children's crafts at SAPL.

Hernandez Participated in the planning of the fall 2015 Mayor's Book Club press launch on Friday, October 9. La Prensa, News 4 WOAI/Fox 29, WOAI AM Radio and the Business Journal attended. Also, she participated in outreach at the *grand opening* of Yanaguana Park on Sunday, October 4 with the Coordinator of Children's Services Viki Ash. Hernandez also attended Social Media Marketing Training on October 5 – 6. Additionally, she participated in the planning and production of the Latino Collection & Resource Center Reception on Wednesday, October 14 and the planning and production of the San Antonio Mini Maker Faire on Saturday, October 17. Also, she participated in outreach at the Magik Theater's Educator Night on Friday, October 16.

In her continual media communications work, Hernandez produced and distributed press releases about: Hispanic Heritage Month, Mayor's Book Club, San Antonio Mini Maker Faire, Seattle Public Library Visit, World Octopus Day. Also, she produced and distributed Press Releases for branch programs at: Central, Carver, Forest Hills and Memorial.

SAPL received **109** media mentions during the reporting period. Also, the total value of broadcast coverage equal **\$69,688**.

Public Information Officer Arturo Gallardo wrote an article in Spanish about the Jobs & Small Business Center for the AMEP newsletter and worked on other translation work to support the production of marketing materials. Also, Gallardo continues the ongoing production of articles for eConnections (November), email blasts of this Weekend at SAPL, and the production of the News & Events newsletter for the department. Additionally, Gallardo participated in the production of the Latino Collection & Resource Center Reception and provided support to the AMEP event at Central. Also, he performed outreach at the Magik Theatre and Playhouse.

Social Media

The social media efforts during the reporting period have yielded the following results: Facebook has 9,750 likes, Twitter has 2,963 followers and Instagram has 661 followers, Pinterest has 45 followers, and YouTube 122 subscribers.

CHILDREN'S (SYSTEM-WIDE)

On Sunday, September 27 over 100 children's book enthusiasts enjoyed an engaging and informative presentation by Author/Illustrator Yuyi Morales. Ms. Morales is a five-time winner of the Pura Belpre Award for Illustration and a two-time recipient of the Tomas Rivera Award. Her picture book "Viva Frida" received a 2015 Caldecott Honor citation as one of the most distinguished contributions to American literature for children. Ms. Morales did an outstanding job of entertaining both the children and adults in the audience while also insightfully outlining her immigrant experience and sharing the rich cultural and artistic traditions of Mexico. Following her presentation, she interacted with many audience members while autographing copies of her books. Special thanks to The Twig Bookstore for handling book sales as well as the San Antonio Public Library Foundation for their support of her visit.

The next children's author on the schedule for a visit to SAPL is Newbery Medalist Jack Gantos. Mr. Gantos will make two presentations on Tuesday, November 3. At 10:00 am he will speak to an audience of third and fourth graders; at 6:00 pm he presents to the general public. In addition to winning the Newbery Award in 2012 for "Dead End in Norvelt," Mr. Gantos has been a National Book Award finalist and the winner of the Printz award for his YA memoir "A Hole in My Life."

School Readiness continues to be a vital element of the Library's strategic plan. On October 8, Mica Clark-Peterek from the COSA Head Start office visited the monthly children's meeting to provide additional insights and information on how Head Start defines School Readiness. Ms. Clark-Peterek defined school readiness in three ways:

- a child's readiness to learn in school
- a family's readiness to support the child's learning and school success
- the school's readiness to help a child learn

As part of her presentation, Ms. Clark-Peterek invited the librarians to identify ways in which SAPL supports school readiness in all three of these realms. Her invitation led to a spirited discussion and a much greater understanding of what the library does and can do to promote school readiness.

TEENS (SYSTEM-WIDE)

Off-Site Service

Teen Services staff presented to hundreds of students at several school visits during the reporting period. During school visits, staff show students a video created by teen library volunteers, discuss resources available through the SAPL, such as Live Homework Help from Tutor.com and test prep from Learning Express Library, and give out library cards.

On September 23, Library Assistant/Teen Liaison Victoria Tijerina (Memorial), Teen Library Assistant Manager Kathleen Fordyce (Central), and Teen Services Librarian I Caroline Mossing (Central) spent the day at Memorial High School presenting to students.

On September 30, Fordyce and Library Assistant/Teen Liaison Lucy Villa (Maverick) spoke with students at Marshall High School and signed them up for library cards. On October 2, Fordyce, Teen Services Librarian I Marco De Leon (Igo), Teen Services Librarian I Kristin Yourdon (Cody), and Librarian I/Teen Liaison Steven Barrera (Thousand Oaks) spoke to students at Health Careers High School and gave several presentations.

Partnerships

Inspire U

Staff involved in the Inspire U Workplace Mentoring Program (part of SA2020), met with their “Littles” for their first meeting of the school year in the Teen Library @ Central on September 28. Bigs and Littles had lunch together and enjoyed catching up with each other after a long break during the summer.

San Antonio Food Bank

As a requirement of the Kids Café afterschool snack program, a Teen Library staff member must attend a monthly nutrition lesson at the Food Bank and provide at least one lesson on nutrition for the teens per month. Library Assistant Regina Almanza (Central) attended the lesson in October.

Professional Development

The regularly scheduled Teen Services Librarian/Teen Liaison meeting was held in the Teen Library at Central on October 14.

Kathleen Fordyce attended one of the City’s SET (Supervisor Excellence Training) classes during the reporting period.

Programming

Teen Services Librarian I Caroline Mossing (Central) organized the first annual San Antonio Mini Maker Faire, which took place on October 17 from 11-4 at the Central Library (Auditorium and Plaza). The Faire featured exhibits by more than thirty local Makers, as well as three free hands-on workshops and two live musical performances. Teen Makers ran exhibits focused on robotics, 3D printing, and computer programming, as well as one showcasing Teen Services at SAPL. Attendance at this event exceeded

1,000. Exhibits, workshops, and performances included hands-on weaving demonstrations, competitive FRC-league robots (built by high school robotics teams), a Raspberry Pi-powered photobooth, amplified viola and cello with a homemade robotic drummer, paper marbling, an electric water purification system, and an open-source 3D printed humanoid robot. This event came together with help from many others in the library system, especially the Marketing team and Public Information Officer Marcie Hernandez, Teen Services Librarian I Karen Barton (Tobin @ Oakwell), and Coordinator of Teen Services Jennifer Velasquez. Librarian III Ashlee Chavez (Central Reference) and Librarian III Kate Simpson (Central Children's Services) and their teams really helped to get the word out about this event. Special thanks go to the San Antonio Public Library Foundation for generously sponsoring this event.

Library Assistant JD Elizondo (Teen Library @ Central) arranged for teens from Fox Tech High School and the Henry Ford Academy to be present for the Mayor's Book Club kick-off on October 9.

Other items

Teen Library Assistant Manager Kathleen Fordyce (Central), Teen Services Librarian Caroline Mossing (Central), and Teen Services Librarian Marco De Leon (Igo) served on an interview panel to select a candidate for the part-time position of library assistant in the Teen Library at Central. Interviews were held on October 7.

CENTRAL LIBRARY TEENS

Mondays with JD Elizondo (Library Assistant): JD continued Eclectic Electric music programming, with teen planning and development of the annual Haunted House comprising the bulk of the "Eclectic" component. On three occasions in September, classes from the Henry Ford Academy visited the Teen Library to participate in a design challenge for the haunted house. While the teens are taking charge of the design, make up, acting, and construction of the haunted house, Elizondo is helping to facilitate by creating music for the haunted house via the recording software in the Teen Studio.

Tuesdays with Caroline Mossing (Librarian I): During the reporting period, Mossing hosted Science & Tech Tuesdays. Teens worked on some long-term projects this month, including a charlieplexed LED cube for the upcoming San Antonio Mini Maker Faire. As always, 3D printing was a popular activity, and some teens designed personalized items to print while others modified existing models to their specifications. A group of teens from a nearby high school have begun the process of creating a Coding Club at the Teen Library, with the ultimate goal of building a smartphone application.

Wednesdays with Kathleen Fordyce (Librarian II): On Wednesdays, teens pick their favorite video or board game and engage in friendly competition with their peers. During the reporting period, teens have enjoyed playing the WiiU games, as well as board games like Chess, Jenga and Apples to Apples. Library Assistant Victoria Tijerina also facilitates craft activities some Wednesday evenings.

Thursdays with Regina Almanza (Library Assistant): Culture, holidays, and creativity ranked on high on Thursday night teen times at Teen Library. In honor of *Hispanic Heritage Month*, teens attempted various Latin American-inspired teens replicated *amate*-style paintings by using India ink, recycled thin cardboard,

markers and paint. The following week, teens attempted the popular Latin American dessert, the *tres leches* cake. Teens used the microwave to bake cakes in a mug, and then doused their mini-cake with a mixture of the *tres leches* in different forms: evaporated, cream, and condensed. The results were amazingly tasty. Some teens requested that they attempt to make *chocoflan*, a layered chocolate cake and flan dessert. It was an intense preparation, and teens felt the process worth it after tasting. Thursdays in October offer teens Halloween-themed crafts, foods, and decorations. Teens used wire, paper, pom poms, and glue to make giant and mini-spiders. Using glass jars, sand, moss, and fake spiders, teens created a graveyard terrarium. They also shaped and baked polymer clay into headstones and pumpkins for a creepy effect. Teens also used chocolate ice cream, crushed cookies, and candy pumpkins to create a graveyard they could eat. Teens created edible eyeballs with flavored gelatins. After Thursday programs have concluded, in a non-competitive environment, teens played video games. Tours and Groups

On October 9, Teen Library staff provided tours of the Central Library to two school groups, Fox Tech High School and the Henry Ford Academy. Students also received catalog and database instruction.

CHILDREN'S

The Central Children's Department saw several personnel changes this month with several vacancies filled and much-deserved promotions. Julia Pouliot joined the team as a Children's Librarian I and has already become an integral and valued staff member. She moved from Florida to take the position and her positive, adventurous spirit has set her on course to becoming an exceptional Children's Librarian. The Central Children's Department was also excited for Shannon Seglin, formerly the Children's Librarian I at the Semmes Branch Library, to join the team when she was promoted to Children's Librarian II at Central. Her expertise and programming savvy has already shown her to be a highly capable Assistant Manager and she is truly an asset to the department. The Children's Department was happy to see Children's Librarian I Jasmin Salinas promoted to Children's Librarian II as well, though sadly it takes her away to the Landa Branch Library. She constantly seeks out professional development opportunities and recently completed an intensive online bilingual story time training course. Her exceptional talents will serve her new location well, though the Central Children's Department will sorely miss her, as evident by the farewell celebration and handmade gift the team crafted for her.

Children's programming at the Central Library continued to delight families with engaging learning experiences. Ms. Salinas wrapped up her tenure at Central with exuberant Toddler Time programs for the families that have to come to treasure her time here. During her final programs, toddlers and caregivers sang fun songs, jumped and wiggled, played with a giant, colorful parachute and enjoyed an eclectic selection of her favorite books. Kids dressed up as veterinarians to help heal puppet friends, crawled through tunnels filled with paper hay, and built ramps and bridges for cars and trucks during free play time. They also got to get their hands dirty with bird seed play dough and sensory bins. Ms. Salinas also presented the *Star Wars Reads Family Fun* celebration. She shared a book written by an astronaut and led the group in a raucous Star Wars guessing game in which they discussed their favorite characters. The families then worked together to create their own R2D2 inspired droid and added to a collaborative chalk art space scene.

Nohemi Lopez Rosdahl, Collection Development Librarian, presented her popular Bilingual Story Time on alternating Tuesday evenings. Her gentle and patient style made learning the Spanish words for colors a pleasure for the children in attendance. Later they created vibrant watercolor masterpieces while practicing the Spanish words they had learned. Ms. Lopez Rosdahl celebrated *Hispanic Heritage Month* with a variety of bilingual stories and a *papel picado* craft in another well received program.

Cresencia Huff, Little Read Wagon Librarian, conducted the last Play & Learn programs of the season at the Central Library. Each program saw an increasingly large audience, which is a testament to the popularity of this program and her skill at delivering it. The Central Children's Department enjoyed hosting this program and is indebted to its sister department for helping to share the programming load during a time of short staffing. By working together, they were able to ensure that the families who visit the Central Library could continue to enjoy a variety of enriching programs.

Children's Department Manager Kate Simpson wrapped up her many years of presenting Family Fun programs this month as she trained Ms. Pouliot to take the helm of this longstanding Saturday program. During one of the last three Family Funs, Ms. Simpson celebrated *Hispanic Heritage Month* with some of her favorite picture books from the Latino Collection, accompanied by a *papel picado* craft. For another program, the focus was on the food of the Fiesta city and the children enjoyed making play dough pan dulce. Finally, Ms. Simpson presented a Family Fun in conjunction with the Maker Faire event, where children heard inspiring stories about inventors and craftspeople and then forged their own imaginative creations from recycled materials.

The Children's Department continued to develop relationships with local schools and organizations this month. The department's connection to neighboring San Antonio College was enhanced by a visit from their Early Childhood Education class, who met here with their professor to examine the picture book collection as part of their coursework. Library Assistant Mary Elizabeth Fernandez presented a Halloween preschool story time to the SAC Early Childhood Center and delivered a bounty of spooky books for the teachers to share with the children this month. Ms. Salinas also delivered books to the Central Christian Daycare Center, as part of the department's long standing relationship with the school. Ms. Simpson was thrilled to attend the kickoff celebration for the COSA Early Head Start program and the luncheon celebrating the SAReads organization this month. Finally, the department provided a special tour of the Central Library for a group of parents from the PreK4SA South campus, in a continuing effort to strengthen the bond between the SAPL and the vital COSA PreK4SA program.

Every Child Ready to Read Workshops for Parents

This year Little Read Wagon staff will offer a series of three workshops at the large Head Start and Pre-K 4 SA centers: "Big Dreams," "Going Places," and "Sounds Like Fun." Each workshop shows parents and caregivers how to use the five practices of talking, singing, reading, writing and playing to prepare their children to learn how to read. Participants have the opportunity to make multiple tools or props to use with their children. Little Read Wagon has completed a series at the Tynan Early Childhood Center (ECE), has offered two of three workshops at the Burleson ECE, and will begin a series at the Carvajal ECE on October 21. Other sites will be served throughout the school year. Prior to each series, Little Read Wagon staff and a librarian from the branch location closest to the school offer a family activity at dismissal time. Jodi Miller (Carver) and Gina Brudi (Las Palmas) joined Little Read Wagon to kick off the programs at Tynan, Burleson and Carvajal.

In addition to the series of workshops, Little Read Wagon is offering one-time visits to smaller sites. During the reporting period visits were made to Medio Creek and Glenoaks elementary schools. Many more campuses are on the schedule for the rest of the year.

Every Child Ready to Read Workshops for Teen Parents

Little Read Wagon's teen parent team has also been busy visiting local high school campuses. The workshops, offered either during a parenting class in which the students are enrolled or as part of a special session the campus social worker arranges, also offer a make-and-take activity along with library and early literacy information. Campuses visited during this reporting period are: Marshall, Cooper, Burbank, John Jay, San Antonio Can, MacArthur, Jefferson and South San high schools.

Staff Development

All of the Little Read Wagon team joined the Children's Librarians at their monthly meeting on October 8 and participated in training on School Readiness presented by Mica Clark-Peterek of City of San Antonio Head Start. The entire team also attended a refresher course on proper lifting techniques offered by Risk Management staff.

Youth Outreach Story Time

With the school year now in full session, Story Time resumed at Navarro Early Childhood Center and continued at House of Neighborly Service, Ella Austin, Healy Murphy and Nurturing Hearts.

Play & Learn

A new Play & Learn series began at Millers Pond Park on October 15. The series was preceded by several Pop-Up Story Time visits. A small group of six children and five adults participated in the first program. Little Read Wagon hopes that more families from the neighborhood will join the fun.

Workshops for Early Childhood Teachers

The first "Smart Arts: Enhancing early literacy through creativity" workshop was held October 3 at Pre-K 4 SA South. The training room was just the right size for the group and the workshop content was very enthusiastically received. Most of the participants had never been to a Pre-K 4 SA center, so the director, Belinda Gonzalez, very graciously offered them a tour at the conclusion of the workshop. The January 23 workshop already has a waiting list, and the February 20 workshop will soon be full.

Community Events

Little Read Wagon presented three early literacy programs at Northside Independent School District's Storyfest, held October 10 at Stevens High School. Approximately 500 people attended the event which included author workshops, a book fair, and a book distribution. Families with young children who attended the Little Read Wagon presentations enjoyed a story time, salt writing, and making their own fold-up mailboxes and streamer sticks.

Little Read Wagon hosted the Jardín de Lectura (Reading Garden) at Univisión's Second Annual Education Fair held October 17 at San Antonio College. The Reading Garden featured several Univision personalities who read books from the San Antonio Public Library collection to groups of children and their parents. Children also had the opportunity to play with play dough and draw with the local stars. The event was expected to have more than 2,000 people in attendance.

BRANCH LOCATIONS

BAZAN

In celebration of *Hispanic Heritage Month*, the Bazan Branch Library hosted the program entitled *Curandero Secrets* on October 10. The program was well attended by many who came to listen and learn from herbalist Don Jacinto Madrigal who spoke about the plants he grows and their traditional uses in herbal remedies.

Bazan received an invitation to attend KIPP Academy's San Antonio's Reading Night on September 30. Library Assistant & Teen Liaison Jennifer Martinez attended the event and spoke to students and families about Teen, Children's, and LEARN@SAPL services at Bazan. Ms. Martinez will be collaborating with the KIPP librarian to further introduce SAPL services to students and families during the regular school year and summer.

During the months of September and October, a record number of community members took advantage of the Bazan Learn Center's offerings. Scheduled learning sessions continued to draw a large number of attendees. Three volunteers led weekly learning sessions and garnered rave reviews from patrons. On October 7, Teach for America alumnus Rodrigo Monroy began leading an ESL group on Wednesday evenings. Mr. Monroy possesses a background in teaching and bilingual education, having taught in both San Antonio and Mexico.

Learn Training Officer Emily Sauer met with Mark Sanchez, Adult Education Specialist for SAISD, on October 1 to discuss the Library's agreement with ESC 20 that allows students to receive credit for time spent working in the Learn Center. As a result of the meeting, Mrs. Sauer and Mr. Sanchez agreed upon strategies to promote the option among students.

Children's Librarian Hope Sonnen had several special activities going on in October. On October 8, she had a Come & Go Craft activity to celebrate *World Octopus Day* where children made and decorated different kinds of octopuses. On October 10, she had another Come & Go Craft to celebrate *Star Wars Reads Day*. The children enjoyed both activities. Ms. Sonnen was invited to La Trinidad United Methodist Church on October 6 to celebrate *National Night Out*. She talked to thirty adults and six children and gave out lots of material explaining library services for children, teens and adults.

BROOK HOLLOW

In October, the Children's Department had a record-breaking attendance at Play and Learn. One hundred and thirty people attended the clothing themed event. Children and their caregivers made a watercolor and salt craft, played with water floral beads, and participated in many other activities that encourage reading, playing, writing, talking, and singing.

On October 8, Brook Hollow Branch Library celebrated *World Octopus Day* with an octopus-themed Come and Go craft.

Brook Hollow is once again offering American Sign Language classes for all ages on Sundays at 3 p.m. These classes are taught by MacArthur High School honors students. This is the third school year that Brook Hollow has hosted American Sign Language classes, and they continue to be very popular.

The Brook Hollow Friends of the Library group held their annual book sale on Saturday, October 10, and successfully raised over \$2,000 to support the library.

On October 14, Brook Hollow held a program on reducing the effects of stress in your life. The presentation was based on the book "How to Beat the Stress and Get More Out of Life" by Murray Oxman.

Brook Hollow hosted seven book discussions this month. Titles discussed included "Writing Jane Austen" by Elizabeth Aston, "Testimony" by Anita Shreve, and "The Hound of the Baskervilles" by Arthur Conan Doyle.

CARVER

Children's Librarian Jodi Miller continued to assist Landa Branch with their Baby Time and Toddler Times on Tuesday mornings. She weeded the juvenile Dr. Seuss and poetry collections from information provided by Central Library's Children's Department. On September 25, she was a delegate to the 17th Annual Congress on Children held at the Whitley Theological Center.

Assistant Manager and Teen Services Liaison Monty Holcomb hosted five Teen Time events with the Wii at the Carver Branch Library. Mr. Holcomb also hosted five Chess Events and is pleased that a mother and her three children now seem to enthusiastic regulars. CODY

Tweens were excited about using the iPads to play the Minecraft for Tween Time on September 14. Boys and girls partnered up to play the challenging game.

Rawlinson Middle School Librarian Ms. Delarosa invited Children's Librarian Sheila Acosta to provide information on the *Young Pegasus* contest on September 15. Ms. Delarosa is encouraging as many students as possible to enter the annual poetry contest. Acosta was invited to come back to the campus to collaborate on tween programming.

Acosta visited two classes at the Pineapple School on September 15, where she read stories about the fall season and the stars. The pre-school children had been studying the galaxy.

Acosta said they were most excited about using their library cards to check out the books they found during the scavenger hunt.

Tweens had an opportunity to play Frisbee golf for Tween Time on September 28. It was the boys versus the girls, and the competition continued with a couple of rounds of *Dance Freeze*, which is one of their favorite activities.

The Tween Book Club met on September 30 to discuss their selection, *The Awesome Almost 100% True Adventures of Matt & Craz*. Not all of the tweens liked the book, which made for a great discussion.

On October 1 and on October 15, children were able to turn rocks into their favorite animals at *Rocky Pals* program, which is always a popular event. All materials were provided by the instructor Frank Ramirez.

About 25 children attended the monthly DUPLO Day on October 2. Toddlers and preschoolers used the soft blocks, puzzle mats, giant DUPLOs, and an assortment of stacking toys to explore their creative sides.

Ghosts were the order of the day Tween Time on October 5. Each tween created 2-3 ghosts to be used to decorate the juvenile fiction area. In addition to the ghosts, tweens had an opportunity to create objects with LEGOs.

Acosta visited Kids Campus and Chabad Gan-Gani Daycares on October 6 and October 8 respectively. Pumpkins made out of scrapbooking papers were created during Tween Time on October 12. After the pumpkins, tweens were anxious to challenge one another to a game of *Smart Mouth*.

Both adults and children were enthused to learn about the Mexican free-tailed bats and other types of bats. Bat crafts followed the presentation. Library Assistant Deborah Bender awarded bat door prizes to attendees.

During this past month teens watched a scary movie, created Dream Catchers, made edible haunted houses, and pumpkin spice pretzels. Teen Leaders hosted another Teen Library Leadership Council to plan activities for October. All selected programs celebrate Halloween.

One particularly successful program had teens creating laser obstacle course using a laser pointer, three small mirrors, and a solar light. The teens worked together to problem-solve and modify the provided instructions to make it work properly. The teens set up the course and then had to figure out how to line up the mirrors and angle them just right, so that the laser showed up in the right spot. They also had to change the rules of the game when they found that the solar light did not turn off when the laser hit the panel. They did a great job working together to set up the course. They had even more fun navigating through the course once it was ready.

Teen Librarian Kristin Yourdon brought out craft supplies on a Thursday afternoon to have teens help decorate the Teen space for Halloween with crepe paper black roses and hanging paper bats.

Yourdon also had the opportunity to visit two organizations to promote library services. On October 2, Yourdon, along with other SAPL teen librarians presented information about library services to the freshman class at Health Careers High School. On October 6, she assisted with a SAPL informational table at the University of Texas at San Antonio *National Night Out* event.

On September 26, Cody hosted the San Antonio Cervecedores, a local nonprofit organization that promotes homebrewing through education, outreach and community-building. Attendees expressed appreciation for the event, especially on the educational aspect of the program.

On October 3, the San Antonio Water System held a Rapid Response event at Cody to address customer concerns over recent, high water bills. Over 160 SAWS customers were seen in one-on-one sessions that day. While attendance was high and stressed the resources of the library, careful planning and coordination between SAWS and library staff ensured that the event ran smoothly.

On October 10 and 11, the Friends of the Cody Library conducted their semi-annual book sale.

COLLINS GARDEN

Collins Garden staff members are working together to plan the Collins Garden Grand re-opening on Saturday, January 9, 2016. Personnel are eagerly awaiting permission to report and begin setting up the building.

CORTEZ

Children and adults alike enjoyed special crafts and displays on September 19 for *Talk Like a Pirate Day*. *National Play-Doh Day* was a hit during Family Fun and was repeated due to popularity. Children watched play dough made from simple household ingredients – salt, flour, water, oil, and food coloring. On Wednesdays, Story Time takes place at 11:00 a.m. and Game Time at 3:30 p.m. The first Tuesday of the month is Movie and Game Night at 6 p.m., and Family Fun is on Tuesdays at 4 p.m.

The San Antonio Parks and Recreation department celebrated *80 Years of Dance* with a dance program at the branch. The program was standing room only to see the young participants in the program perform dances celebrating *Hispanic Heritage Month* and classic dances from different eras.

On October 10, the branch celebrated *Star Wars Reads Day* which was a great success! *The Sith Shadow Council* of Texas was invited to demonstrate their dueling skills and answer questions about all things *Star Wars*. *The Star Wars Book Display* was bare by the end of the program and 15 happy patrons enjoyed the program.

For the month of August, the Cortez Gettin' Crafty Crafters Group learned how to decorate cakes with buttercream frosting. This proved to be much harder than the fondant classes. However, in the end the ladies were very happy with their finished product and are excited for the next cake decorating classes. In September, the group is working on clay pot birdfeeders and birdbaths and Halloween candle holders.

For September, the Cortez Gettin' Crafty Crafters Group has started out with crafts for the fall. The group made clay pot bird feeders/baths that turned out to be beautiful and colorful. Next, they covered vases with colored Epsom salt to give great color when the candle is burning. ENCINO

Tween Time has been a welcomed addition to children's programming at the Encino Branch Library. Tweens have enjoyed coding on the Mondopads, constructing a motor, and crafting during the reporting period. Many of Encino's patrons have shown interest in eBooks, eAudiobooks, electronic periodicals, and downloadable music. Patrons can receive personalized assistance with their devices at either the circulation or reference desk. To ensure that patrons continue receiving incredible customer service with downloadables, two new employees were sent to Basic OverDrive Training during the reporting period.

Encino's marketplace area has been rearranged to showcase the Young Adult Express Collection, a selection of materials for tween (ages 9-13) readers, and an enhanced Juvenile Express Collection.

Several illustrations by Juan Carlos Ramos are featured in the front lounge area and Children's Space. Patrons have enjoyed the changes and complimented the library on "always having something new." Encino's Collaborate space is growing in popularity as area small business owners and non-profit organizations learn about its benefits and unique features. Collaborate was checked out 31 times during the reporting period. Another of Encino's unique features, the drive thru window, remains a pleasant experience with close to 40 patrons serviced each day.

FOREST HILLS

A new monthly program joined the Forest Hills lineup in the month of September. The Urban Sketching and Drawing group will meet every last Saturday of every month, from 10 a.m. to noon. Artists of all levels are encouraged to bring personal art projects and socialize with a group of creative people.

The Forest Hills Branch Library started the new fiscal year with a number of exciting programs. On October 3, patrons were invited to take part in the *Chalk-It-Up Warm-Up* to practice their chalk wielding skills on the library's sidewalks for the annual *Chalk It Up* event hosted by ArtPace. Partnerships continued with the Children's Shelter through a program called iParent. In addition, the NISD program called Precious Minds continued to offer classes at the branch.

Adults Services

Adult Services Librarian Cindy Moreno hosted the Book discussion for both the branch and at the Alicia Trevino Senior Center. The book that was discussed was *Out of Africa* by Isak Dinesen. Customers stayed to watch the movie as well.

With the help of Human Resources staff, Cindy Moreno scheduled a visit from Deer Oaks Facilitator Calleen Friedel who presented the training *Maintaining Respect and Civility* for Staff on September 23. A variety of Halloween Displays are decorating the branch. Creative staff members Christine Martinez, Monica Trejo, Stephanie Vazquez, Patricia Martinez, Jose Jimenez, and Sarah Vinton all either helped or created a Halloween display.

Children's Services

Children's programs continue to draw large numbers of participants and we are excited to be serving so many families! Story Times that focus on early literacy for toddlers are especially popular. Children's Librarian Cari Raley created a variety of learning activities for those participating in the weekly events that create learning opportunities for children and their families.

The Drama Team is currently meeting in preparation for the Enchanted Library program planned for November. Team members are busy writing their skits, practicing the performance, and building their memorization skills.

Teens Services

Teen programs at Great Northwest included an Adventure Time Evening. Teens enjoyed making crafts inspired by the show including Cubeecraft characters and face masks.

Teens celebrated *Hispanic Heritage Month* with several different events that celebrated Hispanic Culture. Teens made different foods including fruit cups and corn cups; they recreated art from Hispanic artist, and made Makech Jewelry during the Teens Create Maker Space.

On October 3, the Great Northwest Branch Library hosted a Super Smash Bros Mini Tournament where teens could compete for first and second place. Teens used Challonge.com to register players for a double elimination tournament and tracked their progress using the websites online bracket system. He held an eBook training session on September 25. Edward represented the branch and SAPL at the *National Night Out* event on October 6, speaking with 20 members of the community.

Library Assistant Mary Lou Bleichwehl created materials for the branch display TV highlighting *Happy Cat Month* and worked with Circulation Assistant Allison Fink to display Allison’s “Staff Picks.” She assisted Children’s Librarian Arlene Richardson’s *National Play-Doh Day* activity.

IGO

Children’s Services

The Children’s Services Department at the Igo Branch Library continues to enjoy very vigorous attendance at all five weekly early literacy programs, as well as LEGO Club, Tween Time, Read to a Dog, and Come and Go Crafts for school age children. The children’s service staff also added a couple of special Family Fun events to the fall schedule.

On Wednesday, September 16, area families were invited to participate in *National Play-Doh Day*. Homemade Play-Do, dough rollers and shape cutters, as well as other craft materials, were available for children of all ages to express their artist talents during the hour-long session. To celebrate *Hispanic Heritage Month*, the weekly Come and Go Craft on October 2 was to create a *Señor Calavera* (skull) art

mask representative of customary “sugar skulls” often seen in traditional *Día de Los Muertos festivities*. In addition to the Come and Go Craft, the Igo Library was pleased to provide the opportunity for patrons to enjoy the San Antonio Parks and Recreation Department's performance event entitled *80 Years of Dance*. Claudia Rubio and her talented dance troop treated guests to a live presentation of ballet, ballet folklórico, flamenco, and jazz. The library is always pleased to offer library guests the unique opportunity to experience fine arts by local young talents. Bravo to all for bring this cultural program to patrons of all ages!

Lastly, the Igo Branch Library continues its commitment to area education partners by hosting story times for community early childcare facilities and elementary schools. In September, kindergarteners and teachers from the Suburban School enjoyed a variety of children's favorites and had the opportunity to explore the library during their public library field trip. For this reporting period, Children's Librarian Nancy Rodriguez, with the assistance of library staff, presented twenty programs serving approximately 2,100 children and their caregivers.

Teen Services

Teen programs were offered at Igo four times each week: Teen DIY, a craftmaking program, met every Monday evening; Home School Hangout met on Tuesday afternoons; FNKY YES Time met on Wednesdays; and OTAKU Anime Club met on Thursday afternoons. Gamers had the opportunity to match wits and skills in a Super Smash Brothers tournament on October 10. Mr. De Leon represented Igo at an outreach event at Health Careers High School on October 2.

Adult Services

October 3 was Beatles Day at Igo. For youngsters there were games and crafts; for adults there were a movie, John Lennon's *Imagine*, and a talk by UTSA music professor Drew Stephen. For everyone, there was a hair-shaking contest.

The Afternoon Book Club met on September 15 to discuss JoJo Mayes' "Me Before You," while at the same time, the Genealogy Club learned how to use Family Tree Maker software from T. Scott Atkinson of the San Antonio Genealogical and Historical Society. On October 7, the Mystery Club discussed Jo Nesbo's "The Bat" and finalized plans for an Interactive Mystery to take place on Halloween. Club members have chosen a classic mystery, from which they will create a "crime scene" for patrons to examine. Guests who correctly solve the crime and guess which novel the scene was derived from will win a prize. Preparations are underway for a book signing on November 7 by John Igo, for whom the branch was named. Mr. Igo will be signing copies of his new book "A Stone for Plot Four."

A reception was held on September 14 in honor of artist Joe Harjo, whose photographs are on display in the lobby. On September 19, writer Jolene Navarro presented a class on *Writing Emotion*.

Grandparents Day was celebrated on Sunday, Sept. 13. Forty-three people of all ages enjoyed a panel commemorating their grandparents through poetry and memories, a Children's Reading Corner for stories about grandparents, a slide show of grandparents, and various craft activities.

On September 14, a series of hula dance classes for the 50+ began with 17 participants. These classes continued on September 21 with 12 attending, September 28 with 11 attending, and will conclude on October 5.

On October 1, the Elderberries had Dr. M. Kathryn Brown, UTSA Anthropology Professor, present her research and field studies of the Mayan culture. This included the new technology to find archaeological sites in the Maya Lowlands, as well as her recent research at Xunantunich, Belize – 24 people attended.

JOHNSTON

The Johnston Branch Library hosted the organization Mi Familia Vota for *National Voter Registration Day* on September 22. Their representative staffed a table for about two hours and encouraged customers to register to vote.

On October 6, Johnston participated in *National Night Out*. Three neighborhood events were attended by Branch Manager Marcia Spaulding, Adult Librarian Monica Garza and Library Assistant Megan Stanley. On October 14, Children's Librarian Beverly Wrigglesworth attended a ribbon cutting ceremony at the Harmony School of Excellence.

Wednesday night Teen Time at Johnston has garnered much more attention and attendance has doubled this past month. The teens enjoy hanging out in their own space playing video games, making art, and eating snacks.

Library Assistant Megan Stanley has transformed the homework help program for teens on Monday nights into a Career/College Prep Night for all ages. She has helped one high school senior apply for 3 colleges and he will be a first generation college student next year. Stanley also assisted an adult new to the workforce in the basics of Microsoft Office to help her transition to her new job. Attendance for the Monday night program has been low, but we are increasing our advertising efforts and those who have come have greatly benefited!

The Johnston teens have expressed interest in bringing the Anime Club back to life, so Ms. Stanley has been meeting with teens to pick out a good day and time to start this back up.

Displays were a Scary Movie display to make it easier for those patrons in search of some thrills and chills to locate some good picks.

Adult Services Librarian Monica Garza Bustillo accomplished the following tasks:

On September 16, Bustillo facilitated the Athena Readers Book Club discussion of Paula Hawkins's *Girl on the Train*. Several Athena Book Club members have started a Facebook page to promote more discussion.

On September 21, she organized a sky viewing event titled *Come Meet the Stars*, with the San Antonio Astronomical Association.

On September 22, she attended the Meadow Village Neighborhood Association Meeting.

On September 26, Bustillo hosted a large *Batman Day* celebration for over 85 patrons including *Batman*, *Cat Woman* and the *Joker*.

On September 29, she presented library information at the Springvale Neighborhood Association meeting.

On October 3, she presented the newly released *Avengers Age of Ultron* film.

On October 17, Bustillo organized a *Pumpkin Carving and Decorating* event.

Displays were *Banned Books Week* with a display of challenged material and Halloween.

LANDA

Teen Time continues to meet weekly on Wednesday nights at the Landa Branch Library. Teen volunteers J.C. and Sophia have been busy each Wednesday preparing for *The Clash of the Titles* competition in observance of *Teen Read Week*. This "guess the quote source" contest will take place on Wednesday, October 21. The teens have also been busy creating book-themed decorations for the teen area. On October 3 the Teen Library Leadership Council (TLLC) had their monthly meeting and they continued their hard work organizing for *The Clash of the Titles* competition. The TLLC also started planning an event for the upcoming *International Games Day* on November 21.

Children's Services is fortunate to have Jodi Miller from Carver assist with Landa's popular children's programming during the time the branch has been without a full-time children's librarian. Miller has taken the Tuesday morning Baby Time and Toddler Time. Adult Services Librarian Karen Sebesta has been covering the Thursday morning Story Time. Parents, caregivers, and children are all appreciative of their work and are looking forward to the arrival of new Children's Services librarian Jasmin Salinas – who is already planning exciting new events!

Adult programming is well under way for the fall with both reading clubs in high gear. This past month, Reader's Ink read the award-winning and provocative "House of the Spirits" by Isabel Allende. The Seniors' Mystery Book Club read "An instance of the Fingerpost" by Iain Pears, a lengthy, complex novel that all members agreed was worth the turn of events in the last two dozen pages of the book.

Landa is fortunate to have a corps of good and faithful volunteers. The branch has recently added adult volunteers Wayne Witt and Penny Lockhart. There is a volunteer on hand to assist with pulling router, packing crates and doing assorted other tasks almost every day.

LAS PALMAS

In early September, Las Palmas Branch Library concluded its two summer semester courses in partnership with **Academia América** for citizenship application and test assistance. One class is given in Spanish and the other is in English. Since public interest increased during initial sessions, a fall semester was scheduled for both classes. Sessions began on October 9.

Adults got a lot out of the return of Habitat for Humanity to Las Palmas on October 5. Twenty people attended. Seven people filled out and submitted the applications to the representative that day. Seven others took the application home to complete and turn in later. Since the Monday afternoon time slot seemed successful, Habitat for Humanity was booked for 6-month intervals at the same day and time.

The Teens decorated pumpkins. Two of our volunteers have formed a Teen Leadership Council and decorated a display for Halloween. Bilingual Story Times continue to be enjoyed at Las Palmas. Circulation Attendant Patricia Perez collaborated with Our Lady of The Lake University on September 26 at an outreach event with OLLU Library and Barnes & Noble at La Cantera. Ms. Perez read children’s stories in Spanish and spoke with customers about obtaining library cards and library services offered. Children’s Librarian Gina Brudi provided enthusiastic outreach efforts at multiple child-care facilities. Ms. Brudi also represented the library at the YWCA’s National Night Out event.

MAVERICK

Many activities and programs occurred at Maverick Branch Library during the reporting period. The Friends of Maverick Library had a successful book sale on September 19 and 20, earning over \$2,000! Also, on September 19, Library Assistant J.D. Elizondo, from the Central Teen department treated 22 patrons to an electric guitar performance.

The Literacy Caravan visited Maverick on September 21! There were 122 caregivers and children that boarded the van to do literacy-based activities and each child received a free book to take home. LEGO Time has continued to thrive on Monday afternoons with an average of 30 people each week.

On September 26, staff members planned an afternoon of fun for *Batman Day*. Over 63 patrons enjoyed decorating and eating Batman cookies, creating Batman origami, coloring Batman pictures and watching the movie, "Batman Begins." Thank you to Library Aide Raina Oster, Circulation Attendant Elise Garcia, Library Aide Cetta-Dae Poore, Children's Librarian Amy Roberts, and Library Aide Daniella Toll for assisting with this event.

Adult programs were very well attended during the reporting period. A patent program on October 10 had 17 attendees. The Ladies Choice Book Club continues to have an average of 14 attending the program.

The branch said goodbye to Library Aide Cetta-Dae Poore in late September. Recently, Library Aide Rebekah Delgado received a promotion as part-time circulation attendant here at Maverick.

McCRELESS

Five Story Times were presented at the McCreless Branch Library during this time period. Opposites and colors were the themes during these five programs. Children listened to stories, sang songs, acted out rhymes and played together with a variety of building blocks, puzzles and other items. McCreless Branch Library hosted a total of 6 teen programs with an attendance total of 50. The library continues to host their weekly Teen Time program and has added a new monthly program titled *Pictures With Words Are Nice!* Teen Time continues to bring teens together to spend time playing various board games and video games. *Pictures With Words Are Nice!* is a program requested by the local teens that centers on comic books, graphic novels, and manga. This is a one hour program in which characterization, plot, narration, writing, and artwork are discussed.

MEMORIAL

Adult Services Librarian Rhonda Davila attended the City's *Employee Appreciation Day* at Sea World on Saturday, October 3, Davila celebrated her 15 years with the City.

For *Hispanic Heritage Month*, Memorial Branch Library held a poetry event entitled *Voces Cósicas* on Saturday, October 10, from 2:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. The event was well attended by thirty-five patrons. Amigos, Memorial's Friends group, funded a reception for the group. The majority of the poets were published authors – Fernando Esteban Flores, Ed Cody, Jacinto Jesús Cardona, Andrea Greimel and Victoria Garcia-Zapata Klein. Other poets included: Juan Antonio Meza, Intreago Flores and Eddie Vega. The event was arranged by Library Assistant Carlos Loera, who did an excellent job coordinating the readings and setting up the program.

For the Halloween season, Memorial hosted *Sixth Sense Paranormal* on the evening of Thursday, October 15. The group presented findings from their investigative work throughout San Antonio. Many of the attendees were interested in learning about local ghostly phenomenon, which accounted for an audience of twenty-seven people. The program content also dispelled some urban legends and presented historical facts that many people were curious about, such as the popular story of the school children at the railroad tracks on the Southside of San Antonio. The presentation included video, photos and sound recordings. At the end of the program, founder Jeff Sullivan opened up the presentation to the attendees' supernatural experiences. Some told of their ghostly encounters and belief in the world beyond. In the spirit of Halloween, this event is held annually at Memorial and has been very popular with customers for many years.

Our Story Time, Kids Time, and Come & Go friends enjoyed celebrating *National Play-Doh Day* by listening to books, singing songs, and creating amazing masterpieces. Many of our school-aged friends had a wonderful time reading to Chiko, the Cocker Spaniel, during our Family Fun, Read to a Dog program.

Many children celebrated *National Library Card Sign-Up Month* by creating and decorating their own library cards, one to take home, and the other to display in Memorial's Children's Area. The children of Memorial also enjoyed building awesome structures for our LEGO/DUPLOs Club. More than seventy-five people attended Memorial Library's celebration of *National Night Out*, where kids decorated wearable, paper plate hats.

Memorial's Children's Librarian Trina Smith was invited to be a guest speaker at Martin Elementary School to discuss the library's services, resources, and programs during the school's monthly Parent Meeting. She was also invited to *Literacy Night* at Madison Elementary School to promote our library services.

The families of Memorial participated in the national literacy awareness program *Star Wars Read Day* where children were encouraged to read and listen to books, make crafts, and discuss all things related to *Star Wars*.

Memorial's juvenile customers celebrated *Hispanic Heritage Month* by checking out books and making crafts such as *calaveras*, paper plate skulls, and *papel picado* – a tissue paper cutting art.

PARMAN

The fall session of DIY U continued with many classes offered on a variety of topics at the Parman Branch Library. Children's Librarian Carrie Vance brought the Alamo Area Fly Fishers in for a class. With the help of Circulation Attendant Melissa Moser and Library Aide Allison Villarreal, Ms. Vance also taught *Exploring with Preschoolers*. National Night Out was held at Parman Branch Library. The Friends of the Library served hotdogs and other refreshments to patrons who came out to hear the School of Rock perform. Lawn games were also provided including a giant version of Twister spray painted on the lawn.

For *Hispanic Heritage Month*, Cortez Branch Library Manager Cate Prazak set up a documentary screening for “Stolen Education” at Parman. Director Rodolfo Luna spoke to a crowd of over 50 people after the film. The program was very well received.

Library Assistant Eva Banda and Library Aide Allison Villarreal set up a table at the Paint the Parkway Pink 5K. They spoke to about 75 people about the library and provided a kids craft.

Parman’s Annual Spooky Walk and Halloween Carnival will be held on October 29 starting at 6 p.m. Several new features will be added this year including a cakewalk and food trucks. Planning is well underway, and all staff is involved in the creation of the event.

PRUITT at ROOSEVELT HS

Children visiting the Pruitt Branch Library recently enjoyed a wide variety of programs. They had the opportunity to celebrate *National Play-Doh Day* by making their own colorful *Play-Doh* from scratch. Once they got the mixture just right, they molded the dough into different dinosaurs and also added plants, trees, and shrubs to complete their scene. To commemorate the San Antonio Botanical Garden’s latest exhibition, *Big Garden, Little Me*, children at Pruitt eagerly listened to Glenda Millard’s “Isabella’s Garden” and had a great time creating colorful paintings featuring colorful “fork” flowers. Recognizing *Hispanic Heritage Month*, children made beautiful *papel picado* banners from colorful tissue paper and were treated to a reading of “Round is a Tortilla: a book of shapes.” The SPARK science program at Pruitt got off to a great start this school year. The teens at the Pruitt Branch Library have been busy. One of the perks of being a Roosevelt student at the Pruitt branch are library fieldtrips. Twenty teen volunteers and 5 adult chaperones attended the Texas Teen Book Festival on Saturday, September 26. They enjoyed buying books and meeting the authors when they got their books signed. They attended author panels and asked questions of the authors and enjoyed literary banter. The event heightened their love for reading books and the importance of the library as a leading force protecting their right to read, especially meeting authors of color and those writing about LGBT issues. During *Banned Books Week*, ninety-one teens participated in a read-out and signed the pledge to be life-long readers and to never ban books and to fight for the freedom to read. When Teen Librarian Rae Downen brought the *Banned Books Week* display out to the courtyard during the student lunches, the teens were in complete shock to find that some of their books for required reading were on the display. Great dialogue was exchanged between the teens and the librarian, but also teachers entered the discussion and by doing so further helped the cause against banning books.

Pruitt librarians participated in Roosevelt High School’s popular *National Night Out* event. They spoke to over 500 children, teens, and parents, informing them about all the great happenings and available resources at the San Antonio Public Libraries. This is among the largest *National Night Out* events throughout the city.

The SNAP, Special Needs Adult Program, at Pruitt featured a celebration of *Hispanic Heritage Month* with some lively playing of the popular game of *Ioteria*. Attendees to this event always look forward to their

library visits for a chance to make crafts, participate in games, and meet new acquaintances. The adult zumba classes continue to be popular at Pruitt with participants always coming back for some fun, dancing and exercise.

SAN PEDRO

The new summer programs at San Pedro Branch Library were successful at attracting children who have not normally come to the library. With that in mind, the popular Monday Minecraft Club is continuing throughout the school year. There have generally been around 10-15 children attending and often not the same children from week to week. This is the same pattern that occurred in the summer and provides a good mix of children each time. Kids Time is on Wednesday (with the first Wednesday of the month being the very popular LEGO Club) and Children's Librarian Betsy Dalton has started a children's chess club on Thursdays, which also has attracted students to the library.

Ms. Dalton presented monthly Story Times to children at Educare Child Care Center (two classes), Study Hall Learning Center (two classes), and Monte Vista Montessori (two classes). Fifteen books were also delivered to each child care class for their use during the month. She also presented a monthly story time to two groups of children (each group was a combination of two classes) at Respite Care, a child care facility for developmentally disabled children. Books were left for each of five classes.

National Play-Doh Day was celebrated on September 16. The children enjoyed squishing and squashing homemade play dough!

Ms. Dalton attended two training classes; one provided by Pre-K4SA on early mathematics for preschoolers and the *Voices for Children* event.

On September 29, a new 5th grade book club met at the library. The book selected to read for next month is "Dying to Meet You" by Klate Klimo.

On September 30, Ms. Dalton represented SAPL at the Hawthorne Academy Family Literacy Night. On October 6, she did the same at the Alta Vista Neighborhood Night Out event. Several of the children she spoke with at these events are now coming to children's programs at San Pedro.

World Octopus Day was celebrated on October 8. The children watched octopuses in action on the iPad and made an octopus to take home.

Star Wars Reads Day was held on October 10. The children and their families enjoyed many Star Wars related activities, crafts, and books.

San Pedro Branch Library was chosen as the site for the Proclamation of October as *Dyslexia Awareness Month*. Library patron Tricia Cantwell worked with city officials on this project. Approximately 20 people attended the reading of the Proclamation by District 8 Councilman Ron Nirenberg.

Branch Manager Diane Backhus and Circulation Attendant Ana Sandoval represented San Pedro at the *National Night Out* event for the Beacon Hill Area Neighborhood. Since Ms. Sandoval is a resident of the neighborhood, she was able to share information with many people she knows.

Branch Manager Diane Backhus is pleased to announce the formation of a branch Friends of the Library Group. Interested members met with “umbrella” Friends of the Library officers Karen Matson and Nancy Gandara on Wednesday, Oct. 7. Officers were elected, and the group discussed the bylaws. The next step will be having the bylaws approved by the Friends Board in November. There will be a lot of great things coming!

Diane Backhus submitted an informational story to the Alta Vista Neighborhood Association Newsletter for November’s issue.

SEMMEES

The LEGO Club that started this summer is still going strong at the Semmes Branch Library. In September, 32 children and adults attended the monthly program. Staff is thankful for the Semmes Friends group which provided the initial supply of LEGO bricks for the club. The Semmes Foundation has also recently agreed to purchase more bricks, to make the LEGO Club even better.

On September 16, Children’s Librarians Randi Jones and Shannon Seglin, hosted a *National Play-Doh Day* program at the branch. Jones and Seglin made several types of homemade play dough and invited children to use their imaginations to create. 29 people attended the program. The leftover play dough was then used by the Tweens who entertained themselves with making “pizzas” and other pretend food items.

In late September and early October, Semmes Branch Library served as a pilot site for the new Computer/Print management system: Pharos. Semmes staff members assisted in testing the new system. Teen Librarian Karen Barton had a book related Play-Doh contest between teens for the most original creations. 
