

Topic: Traditions of Indigenous Tribes

Mr. Herrera will share some of the traditions of his and many other indigenous tribes that typically occur during February. He will talk about traditional medicinal plants and the effects climate changes and natural resource exploration.

Born in 1948, in the Coahuiltecan Sacred Land along the Rio Grande where the Peyote grows, to Maria Lara, a Tlaxcala, Chichimeca, Huichol Indian and Eduardo Herrera, a Tlaxcala and Coahuilteco Indian. Ted is married to Jo Ann Garcia and they have two childred and six grandchildren.

Ted is one of 3 principle speakers of the Tlaxcalteca Nation and Affiliated Tribes of Texas. Retired in 1998 as the Kelly Air Force Base Program Manager for the Production Quality Program where he had oversight responsibilities for the writing policy and procedures that governed over 5000 Aircraft Journeymen in 54 job skills.

The book collection currently contains approximately 10,000 books with 19th century imprints. Also, ten journals with imprints primarily between 1850 – 1877 are included.

Scottish Property Records Online

From tenements to palaces - these records offer a fascinating snapshot of Scotland during the Edwardian era and are a major new genealogy resource

Over 2 million names of Scots included in the property records for 1905 are being released online for the first time via ScotlandsPeople, the official government family history website. The new records, known as the Valuation Rolls and comprising over 2.4 million indexed names and over 74,000 digital images, cover every kind of building, structure or property in Scotland which were assessed as having a rateable value.

The Rolls also reveal much about the changing social fabric of Scotland at this time – such as the growth in women owning property and running businesses, the rise in sports and recreation clubs, the development of music halls and theatres, and the expansion of railway hotels. As the Rolls include details about rents and the value of property, they will also help researchers to learn more about the cost of living during this period.

Fully-searchable by name and address, the records list the names of owners, tenants and occupiers of each property - so genealogists, historians and other researchers can now discover fresh insights into their ancestors' lives through viewing these new records. As the 1905 Rolls appear between census years, they will be invaluable for genealogists who are trying to fill in gaps about their ancestors.

People from all social classes are included in the 1905 Valuation Rolls - from well-known land and property owners, to the tenants of Scotland's tenements. Some of the famous Scots whose property situation appears in the records are A. J. Balfour, Keir Hardie, Sir Hugh Munro, Lady Gordon Cathcart, Lord Armitstead, and Donald Stewart (head gamekeeper to Queen Victoria).

Finding French Coats of Arms

Anne Morddel has written an interesting article (in English) about coats of arms in France. She tells how to check the validity of French coats of arms, using a number of resources available in the Cabinet des Titres that has been microfilmed and can be viewed at the Richelieu building at Bibliothèque nationale de France in Paris.
