"Unknown No Longer: A Virginia Slave Name Database" was launched by the Virginia Historical Society in the fall of 2011. The database contains information about slaves, including records kept by slave owners in Virginia. This database is the latest step by the VHS to increase access to its varied collections relating to Virginians of African descent.

The project certainly is not complete. The database presently contains more than 1,500 slave names and the society is constantly adding more names. It will take years to scour the millions of documents likely to contain the names of the enslaved.

The African American genealogy website, **OurBlackAncestry.com** (often abbreviated as OBA), is developing an online repository of records that name the names of people who were enslaved. This service will be provided FREE of charge and there is no limit to the number of pages/records that can be digitized, the more the better.

The web site managers only ask that donors sign an agreement that gives OBA the right to digitize the material and put it online. Documents will be sent to Utah to be digitized but safe passage and return will be assured. The site is especially interested in records of slaveholding families.
