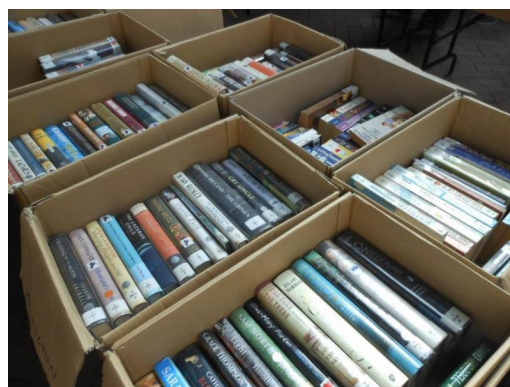

The Upshaws of County Line
[The Institute of Texan Cultures](#)

The UTSA Institute of Texan Cultures will open a new exhibit following descendants of emancipated slaves through 25 years of life in County Line, an East Texas Freedom Colony.

Following emancipation, communities of former slaves began to spring up across the South. Guss, Felix and Jim Upshaw founded the Freedom Colony known as County Line, where they and other newly freed peoples carved out new lives and raised families amidst an ever-evolving society.



Photographer Richard Orton of Nacogdoches, Texas, documented descendants of County Line's original pioneers, still living in the town these many generations later. The exhibit

includes 30 images, conveying the contemporary experience of life in a freedom colony. The exhibit is made possible through a partnership with Stephen F. Austin State University's School of Art Galleries.

1000 Parks and a Line in the Sky

"1000 Parks and a Line in the Sky: Broadway, Avenue of the Future," is a design vision by Antonio Petrov, UTSA assistant professor of architecture, and the "think/do-tank" he has established in the College of Architecture, Construction and Planning. The exhibit features a 50-foot-long model of Broadway, a street that has the potential to become San Antonio's great urban avenue.

Recent developments on Broadway, such as the Museum Reach and the Pearl, and renewed interest in the street's future have generated much discussion about what becoming an "urban" city actually means. In its present state, however, nearly fifty percent of Broadway's urban landscape is flanked by parking space while nearly all spaces along the corridor are tied to businesses, leaving almost no public space for people to gather as citizens without being consumers.

Petrov has conducted extensive research on Broadway and proposes a linear park system, comprised of unused interstitial spaces found along the street, and a skyride that connects the airport to Travis Park. Many residents and visitors to San Antonio remember experiencing the city from the sky between the 1960s and 1990s on the Brackenridge Park skyride. Inspired by this local history, he explores possible future directions for urban development, public parks, and alternative transportation systems using the Broadway corridor as a model.

The interactive installation focuses on public input, while associated public events, roundtable discussions, photo collection events, and educational programming will bridge the past and future of Broadway to help the community imagine its new identity. Visitors are also able to experience a nostalgic moment by taking a seat in a gondola from the original Brackenridge skyride.

Back Up Your Genealogy Files!

It is the first of the month. It's time to back up your genealogy files. Then test your backups!

Actually, you can make backups at any time. However, it is easier and safer if you have a specific schedule. The first day of the month is easy to remember, so I would suggest you back up your genealogy files at least on the first day of every month, if not more often. Of course, you might want to back up more than your genealogy files. Family photographs, your checkbook register, all sorts of word processing documents, email messages, and much more need to be backed up regularly. Why not do that on the first day of each month?

How Many Backup Copies of Important Files Do You Need?

Here's the old data center 3-2-1 rule-of-thumb for backing up:

- 3 copies of anything you care about - Two isn't enough if it's important.
- 2 different formats - Example: Dropbox plus DVDs or Hard Drive plus Memory Stick or CD plus Crash Plan, or more
- 1 off-site backup - If the house burns down, how will you get your memories back?

Trying to Find Where Alamo Heroes Buried

Commissioner Lambert Would Erect a Suitable Memorial on Spot

REPORTS NOT ACCURATE

Public Ceremony Held, But History is Silent as to Location of Grave

Commissioner Ray Lambert has undertaken the task of finding out where rest the bones of Travis, Bowie, Crockett and the brave men who perished with them in the fall of the Alamo. If he is successful in located the spot it is his purpose to erect there a suitable memorial which he believes would be a shrine to all Texans. History is silent on the burial place of the heroes of the Alamo and the traditions which have been handed down are conflicting.

"The least that San Antonio, and Texas for that matter, could do," said Mr. Lambert, "Is to erect a memorial over the place where the bones and ashes of these men are buried. I have often wondered by some such step was not taken and in discussing it with Mayor Brown the other day he suggested that we endeavor to find the grave and mark it in some suitable manner.

Bodies Were Burned

When in Austin recently Mayor Brown consulted authorities on Texas history but could find nothing that would show definitely where these bones were buried. This much we know: after the fortress fell on March 6, 1836, the bodies of the victims were gathered up and burned in two pyres in front of the Alamo. That is as far as recorded history goes. It is known, however, that following the Battle of San Jacinto, after most of the Texans had returned to their homes, the bones and ashes were gathered up and buried with appropriate ceremonies. Nothing of which we have learned, however, discloses the exact location of that grave.

Some thirty years ago Colonel Seguin, then a man past 80 years of age, wrote a letter in which he stated that he, with others, had gathered up the bones of the Alamo heroes and that they were buried at the foot of the altar in San Fernando Cathedral. Dignitaries of the Catholic Church have declared that they have no records showing that the bones of the Alamo heroes were buried in the cathedral.

Not long ago, a copy of a paper was discovered, known as the Texas Telegraph, which was published here in 1837. In this was an account of the funeral ceremonies held over the bones and ashes of the Alamo heroes . It tells with great particularity how these ashes were gathered up, placed in a coffin and taken to the San Fernando Cathedral. Here there was a religious service and it was followed by a procession. The article details the line of march together with the names of the military, religious and civil dignitaries who took part in that procession. It is stated that on the lid of the coffin were engraved the names of Crockett, Bowie, Travis and, I think several of the others who lost their lives in the storming of the Alamo.

Public Ceremony Held

Somewhere on what is now the Alamo Plaza Park, a general public ceremony was held. Colonel Seguin and others were among the speakers and there was a large crowd present. The article closes with the statement that following the ceremony the 'remains were buried,' leaving out the very important feature as to just where this occurred. Now, it has been suggested that when Colonel Seguin wrote that the bones were buried in an urn at the foot of the altar in the San Fernando Cathedral he may have remembered only that first religious ceremony. True, the funeral procession may have returned to the Cathedral but there is a tradition that they were taken to the cemetery then located on East Commerce Street.

Now, it has occurred to us that among the old people living in or about San Antonio there must be many who either attended that ceremony or whose parents have told them about it. It is possible there are several here who know where that grave is and if that article in the Texas Telegraph is correct it could be identified by the coffin with the names of the illustrious ones on that lid. I will appreciate it if anyone having this

information will communicate with me. That grave should be marked with an appropriate memorial for it will be a shrine as long as the heroic history of Texas is read."
